Fate of PJ's majestic mahogany hangs in the balance

WHAT is believed to be the last remaining mahogany (Khaya grandifoliola) tree in Section 17, Petaling Jaya, Selangor has an uncertain fate.

The recent spate of falling trees in cities across the country, most of which involved big non-native trees, compounded by the current heavy rain and strong winds, has gotten the pub-lic concerned.

Some have been urging the

local authority to act fast.

The mahogany is a much loved tree among residents in the neighbourhood.

This non-native mature shade tree, also known as an African mahogany, can grow up to 30m

Petaling Jaya City Council
(MBPJ) councillor Terence Tan,
said there was no decision yet on
the fate of the mahogany tree.
"Some residents have pro-

posed that we carry out work to release the concrete surrounding the tree.

"As the tree grows, it could break the drain and affect the road next to it," he said. A check by StarMetro yester-



sive root system had cracked the surface of the concrete walkway.

Tan said they would consult the MBPJ Landscape Department on possible ways to save the tree. "It is a beautiful tree, easily 40

"There is periodic trimming, but we will also look at what we can do with the base (of the tree)," he added.

Tan said panic had struck residents in the neighbourhood after the sudden surge of falling trees

the sudden surge of falling trees in Kuala Lumpur.

"Some requested that trees up to 3m tall get chopped down, but we cannot go around felling trees; we need to find a balance to assure the public and manage safety," he said.

In February last year, in a StarMetro report titled "Stumped"

mahogany by tree felling", some Section 17 residents shared how they stood for hours under the 275cm-cir-

cumference mahogany tree to save it from being felled. They had called on MBPJ to enforce the Tree Preservation

Order.
Under the Town and Country Planning Act 1976 (Act 172), the Order is to protect big and mature trees from being cut or damaged if the girth of the trunk exceeded 0.8m. Universiti Teknologi Malaysia

(UTM) Skudai asset management division's land planning and development unit head Dr Mohd Suhaizan Shamsuddin said non-native trees like mahogany were introduced into Malaysia

were introduced into Malaysia during the British colonial era.

"The mahogany tree has grown in tropical and semi-tropical climates.

"Several studies have been carried out on trees planted before independence.

"Now, heritage trees over 20 years face increasing threats to their growth and pose risks to the public, particularly in urban areas," said Mohd Suhaizan, who was also a landscape architect

areas," said Mohd Suhaizan, who was also a landscape architect.
He said the mahogany tree could still be saved, but this would involve funds to modify existing infrastructure to maintain its life and sustainability.
"An important consideration is soil characteristic, where the root space for the growth and spreading of large trees need to be stable.

"We must also understand the existing root functions to support the growing tree's canopy,"

ASSESMENT rate hikes in Selayang, Selangor have raised the ire of property owners who recently received their notices. Selayang MCA division chairman Chan Wun Hoong said numerous complaints were received from locals about the property evaluation exercise. "The rate increase is excessive," he said. Citing one example, Chan said a homeowner in Kundang had

received a notice of a more than five-fold increase.

He added that the valuation process lacked standardisation, pointing out that residents in similar properties – two houses apart – were subject to varying increases.

apart – were subject to varying increases.

"We have more than 100 residents and property owners from the low- to middle-income brackets expressing dissatisfaction with the increased financial bur-

den," he said after holding a meeting with the residents.
He said the Selayang MCA division would help residents appeal and compile data that would be highlighted to the Selayang Municipal Council.
"We urge residents who wish to protest or to appeal against the increase to contact us.
"They can come to the MCA Selayang division office in Taman Jati, Rawang between

9am and noon, or 2pm and 4pm, or they can contact our hotline at 019-339 1924 anytime.

"Once we have collected the necessary information, we will submit this to the council by May 31 together with our feedback and suggestions for something more equitable," he said.

Chan hoped the assessment tax hike in Selayang would be commensurate with an improvement of council services.

"There are still many infra-structure issues like poorly maintained roads, so we find it unreasonable to impose this bur-den on residents." he said. Chan also questioned the tim-ing and extent of the rate hikes, considering the recent increases in sales and services tax (SST) and water rates in Selangor. "It is okay to increase the rates, but it has to be reasona-ble," he added.

The root of resilient cities

ON May 7, a 50-year-old tree fell in Jalan Sultan Ismail, Kuala Lumpur, due to sudden heavy rain and strong winds. Sadly, this led to a loss of life, several injuries, and significant property damage. WWF-Malaysia extends our heartfelt sympathy to the affected families and expresses profound sorrow over this event. Following this incident, as well as a few others within the past

Following this incident, as well as a few others within the past week, Kuala Lumpur City Hall (DBKL) is enhancing its Shade Tree Management Plan and preparing new guidelines for managing old and high-risk trees, expected to be completed by July this year. Apparently 175 high-risk trees – mostly over 50 years old have been identified, with 147 already cut down. Inspections by already cut down. Inspections by certified arborists have reportedly identified 28 more high-risk trees slated for removal. In response, Prime Minister Datuk Seri Anwar Ibrahim announced that 100 trees

Ibrahim announced that 100 trees must be planted for every one cut in Kuala Lumpur.

To prevent further tragedies, we urgently need to address the resilience of our cities and the underlying causes. WWF-Malaysia believes that applying nature-based solutions can enhance the secret and custainability of our safety and sustainability of our

urban environments.

Trees play a crucial role in urban areas. Apart from being visually appealing, they mitigate

the urban heat island effect by providing shade and cooling the air. According to the Food and Agriculture Organisation of the United Nations, strategic place-ment of trees in urban areas can cool the air by up to 8°C and reduce air conditioning needs by

reduce air conditioning needs by 30%. Trees also improve the local climate, helping to save energy used for heating by 20% to 50%. Additionally, trees play a part in removing harmful pollutants in the air and storing carbon which helps to mitigate the impacts of climate change. They also provide natural habitats for birds, squirrels and other fauna; also, their mere presence can help reduce

blood pressure and mental stress. As the climate crisis intensifies, incorporating greenery into our cities is a vital adaptation strategy to combat rising temperatures and improve overall urban living

Many experts believe that proper tree care – including regu-lar maintenance – is often overlooked. In some cases, the roots of old trees, which are essential for their stability, are cut, compromis-ing their ability to withstand storms. Ensuring that trees receive proper care is critical to preventing future incidents. Additionally, planting the right indigenous trees around cities is

essential to promote cool spaces and green cover. These tree to be resilient varieties that require less maintenance and are less vulnerable to disease, to

require less maintenance and are less unlinerable to disease, to ensure their growth and survival. Adequate space for root growth and healthy soil conditions are also crucial for the long-term stability and health of urban trees. To build resilient cities, we need to rethink how we use space and interact with nature. By planting and maintaining trees in our cities, we can create urban environments where nature and human civilisation coexist harmoniously. Working with nature, rather than against it, will help mitigate the impacts of extreme weather and create healthier, more sustainable cities.

We support the call for an improved tree management plan improved tree management plan and emphasise the importance of involving experts and stake-holders in its development. We urge interested parties including certified arborists, urban plan-ners, environmental scientists, and communities to ensure the safety and well-being of our whan environments.

Law to transform cities almost ready

Urban Redevelopment Bill targeted for tabling in Parliament in third quarter of 2024

PETALING JAYA: The Urban Redevelopment Bill is currently in its final stages and targeted for tabling in Parliament in the third quarter of this year, says Nga Kor Ming.

The Housing and Local Government Minister said the Bill aimport the control of the property of the Bill aimport of the property of the Bill aimport of the

ment Minister said the Bill, aiming to transform cities in Malaysia, especially those affected by aged buildings or slums, has been agreed to in principle by the Cabinet.

Cabinet.

Additionally, he pointed out that the Kuala Lumpur City Hall (DBKL) had already identified 139 potential sites spanning over 526ha, fit to be redeveloped, rejuvenated and regenerated.

Of the 139 sites, Nga said, 91 were "definitely fit" for residential purposes

tial purposes.
"We strongly believe that identified potential sites may generate as high as RM322.5bil worth of gross development value, thereby creating thousands of high-skilled

job opportunities as well as investment prospects.

"This is the way forward and we are pushing for it (the Bill) to be tabled by the third quarter of this year.

We are working towards the "We are working towards the final phase of drafting the Urban Redevelopment Bill 2024," he told The Star on the sidelines of the StarProperty Real Estate Developer Awards 2024 on Wednesday.

Nga emphasised that the proposed Urban Redevelopment Act

would focus on four areas – urban redevelopment, urban regenera-tion, urban rejuvenation and urban conservation.

"We will preserve heritage buildings and transform them into more liveable (spaces) and high-value buildings," he said. Nga also pointed out how every building had its life span, just like humans

numans.
"Once certified by professionals that it is beyond redemption or no longer suitable for human inhabitants, it is time for us to decide what is next for that old building.

"Here, we have four options: whether to redevelop, regenerate, rejuvenate or conserve them, with all this well thought out," he

Nga gave the assurance that under the ministry's guidelines and laws, the owners' interests will be balanced with those of the developers and business opportu-nities. The ministry, he noted, practised an open policy, where they were ready to listen to con-structive opinions.

"Views that serve the best inter-

"Views that serve the best interests of our country will be adopted as part of our policy," the minister said.

Nga added that they were also looking at amending the Housing Development (Controlling and Licensing) Act 1966.

He said the current Act only covered residential properties and did not protect buyers, owners or developers of commercial properties. properties.

"At the same time, our property

sector has experienced dynamic growth and changes.

"There are certain paradigm shifts with various property cate-gories such as SoVo, SoHo, com-mercial properties, industrial parks and more, which are not covered by the old law.

"Once we have the new law ready, it will encompass all categories of properties under one umbrella," he said, pointing out how it matched the market in Australia and Dubai in the UAE.

Australia and Dubai in the UAE.
Given the journey ahead, Nga
urged all quarters to form strategic partnerships and work together with the Madani government.
"Our aim is to make Malaysia
the centre of the Asean region
and was urge investor to a serior

and we urge investors to come and make Malaysia the gateway to the region," he said, adding that the region was poised to be the fastest-growing economic zone globally.

As the incoming Asean chair-man, Nga said Malaysia was ready to be one of the epicentres for investment, education and tourism.

"We hope the property sector will continue contributing to this vision. Let us work together to fulfil this national mission, where making Malaysia great again is everybody's dream," he said.

Don't go on tree-felling spree, eco warriors tell authorities

PETALING JAYA: The erratic PETALING JAYA: The erratic weather has seen incidences of trees falling recently, but that does not grant the authorities a free pass to go on a "tree-felling" spree, say NGOs and environmentalists. Instead, the authorities should plant types of trees according to the location as well as ensuring their tries in male manages.

their timely maintenance, the groups said.

groups said.

Malaysian Nature Society president Vincent Chow said suitability of trees should be considered for urban spaces and roadsides.

"Big trees like the angsana tree are not suitable at the roadside.

"Suitability of the species and the location are aspects that we should look into," he said. According to Chow, the authori-ties should conduct a thorough

study before planting trees at an area, and also ensure proper tree management procedures are in

place.
"Trees not being maintained or pruned properly is happening across Malaysia. This neglect of trees is what we have to look into," he added.

into," he added.

Sahabat Alam Malaysia president Meenakshi Raman said while it backs Prime Minister Datuk Seri Anwar Ibrahim's call to plant 100 trees for each felled in the city, it is also crucial to protect the trees by having proper management plans.

management plans.
"We support the call by the PM but we are concerned that due to recent incidences, there would be a tree-cutting spree. It's important to protect the trees; they don't simply die or their roots become rotten. If in the course of con-

struction, the roots of the trees are affected, then this could affect the health of trees.

"Hence, it is vital to have proper plans to preserve the trees and not take short cuts which kill the trees," she said.

trees," she said.

Meenakshi said the replanting of trees can be done with proper plans and consultations with experts and arborists, adding that under the Town and Country Planning Act 1976, there are provisions for the protection and preservation of trees by the local authorities

The current approach of priori-tising construction over "green

spaces" must stop as it is crucial to have more trees in cities due to extreme heat and rainfall, she

noted.
"We need to heed the call made (by the PM) and ensure local authorities involve the public to make sure that the plans are implemented," she added.

Meenakshi also said it is important to adveste construction com-

tant to educate construction companies and developers on how to

protect and preserve trees.

The Consumers Association of Penang president Mohideen Abdul Kader said urban roadside trees are now mostly surrounded by impervious pavements, which contribute to poor growth and health of tree roots.

"Mature trees require frequent

monitoring by arborists and care by the local authorities," he said.

He also called on the authori-ties to determine suitable locations for planting new trees by considering factors such as space

considering factors such as space and soil quality.

"Species selection is also impor-tant by prioritising the native spe-cies that provide ecosystem bene-fits such as shade, carbon seques-

tration and air purification.
"Monitoring programmes need to be done to ensure the progress of tree-planting efforts and the

compliance with tree-planting requirements," he said. Mohideen also proposed for local planning authorities to cre-

local planning authorities to create a tree preservation order under the Act.

Anwar had made the "plant 100 trees" call after Minister in the Prime Minister's Department (Federal Territories) Dr Zaliha Mustafa, in the wake of yet another huge tree that toppled onto a road in the capital city, said the Kuala Lumpur City Council (DBKL) had been instructed to promptly fell trees at risk of falling down. ing down.

The incident was the latest in a

spate of trees tumbling down in inclement weather.
On May 14, two stalls at a night market in Nilai, Negri Sembilan, were damaged when a tree was uprooted after heavy rain in the evening.
On May 13, several cars were

struck by fallen trees in Kuala Lumpur following a heavy storm and one of the damaged cars was a police patrol car escorting Melaka Chief Minister Datuk Seri Ab Rauf Yusoh.

On May 8 in Penang, an 80-year-old man was injured after a tree fell on him at the Penang Botanic Gardens while another tree fell across Jalan Macalister in George Town on May 11, heavily dama-

Town on May 11, heavily damaging several cars.

On May 7, a 47-year-old man died after his car was among 17 vehicles hit when an over-half-acentury-old tree fell along Jalan Sultan Ismail, Kuala Lumpur.

On April 4, a 48-year-old man was killed after a tree fell on his car along Jalan Senawang-Paroi near Taman Rashidah Utama in Negri Sembilan

AN AUTOMATED Rapid Transit (ART) trackless tram is undergo ing a trial run in Putrajaya until July 31.

If all goes well, the tram ser-vice is expected to kick off by

vice is expected to kick off by year-end.
Putrajaya Corporation (PP) collaborated with the Transport Ministry and its agency, the Malaysian Institute of Road Safety Research, in coordinating and evaluating the pilot project, aimed at supplementing the existing public transport system in the administrative capital.
PPj engineering and maintenance department senior engineer Muhammad Masrizal Saad said the three-coach tram would operate in two routes.
"Route 1 will be for weekdays, starting from Putrajaya Sentral

"Route 1 will be for weekdays starting from Putrajaya Sentral MRT station, heading towards Dataran Putra and Lingkaran Gemilang, before heading back to the starting point.
"Route 2 will run on weekends, also starting from Putrajaya Sentral MRT station, heading towards IOI City Mall and hack

Rides will be free throughout the trial period. The public are encouraged to try it out," he said.

collect data for improvement of the tram services," he told the media at Nadiputra depot in Precinct 9, where the tram will be parked and charged up. Muhammad Masrizal said the electric vehicle could accommo-

date up to 307 passengers at a

"It is also accessible for wheel-chair-users. The tram driver will help to attach a ramp when necessary," he said.

Many people are expected to try out the new public transport

system.

The tram made its debut at the

The tram made its debut at the Putrajaya Open Day in February and was a hit among visitors.

It was learned that over 10,000 people took the free tram rides during the four-day event.

"We are delighted to be a part in making the proof of concept a success, and look forward to receiving feedback from the public during this phase to enhance the service," he added.

StarMetro checked out the tram on the trial run and spoke to some commuters.

The hefty burden gets heavier

PUTRAJAYA: There has been a surge in the number of overweight and obese Malaysians in the past decade, according to the National Health and Morbidity Survey (NHMS) 2023.

"A persistent rise in the prevalence of overweight and obesity was observed, which has surged by nearly 10 points over a decade from 44.5% in 2011 to 54.4% in 2023," the report stated.

The report said the trend of overweight and obesity was measured according to the Body Mass Index (BMI) of above or equivalent to 25kg/sq m.

Also noted in the report was that abdominal obesity among adults Malaysians also saw a surge to almost a 10-point rise, from 45.4% in 2011 to 54.5% in 2023.

Abdominal obesity is based on waist circumference for men with above or equivalent to a 90cm waist or 80cm for women.

The NHMS also noted that 95.1% of adult Malaysians do not consume adequate fruits and yearstables

vegetables.

"On average, adults consume only two servings of fruits or vegetables instead of the recommended five servings (per day)," the report stated.

Based on the report, 13.5% of Malaysians above 60 have adequate fruit intake while it was 13.9% for those between 50 and

The lowest intake was from those age between 18 and 19 (7.1%) followed by the 20-29 age group (9%), 30-39 (11.4%), and 40-49 (12.7%)

The NHMS 2023 also noted that one in five Malaysians do not drink enough plain water every

Between six and eight 250ml glasses of water is the proper daily intake.

The NHMS 2023 Report is based on data collection sessions conducted between July and September last year.

A total of 13,616 respondents participated in the survey, representing an overall response rate

of 83.2%.

NCD tidal wave has hit the nation

PETALING JAYA: Nearly three million Malaysian adults are afflicted with at least three of the four major non-communicable diseases (NCDs): diabetes, hyper-tension, high cholesterol and abseits:

obesity.

Malaysians living with these conditions are at major risk of a heart disease or stroke, as stated in the National Health and Morbidity Survey 2023 released

The survey found that over half a million of adults in the country were suffering from diabetes, hypertension, high cholesterol and obesity, which are collective-ly known as the "three plus one"

Another 2.3 million adults had three NCDs. For instance, about 5% of them had diabetes, hypertension and high cholesterol; while 2.9% had hypertension,

while 2.9% had hypertension, high cholesterol and obesity.
Dlabetes has been identified as one of the major killer diseases in Malaysia. There has been an upward trend in this disease between 2011 and 2023. Almost 2.6 million or one in six adults. 3.6 million or one in six adults (15.6%) are diabetic.

And unfortunately, two in five people did not know they have the disease. Young adults were

the disease, young addits were affected as well.

"About 84% of adults aged 18-29 years with diabetes did not know that they have diabetes," the report said.

As for diabetic patients, two in five said they had a glucometer at home to check their blood sugar levels. However, 56% admitted that they did not have good blood sugar control.

About 91% of the respondents are on blood pressure medication, while 48% have their blood pressure under control.

A million depressed Malaysians

PUTRAJAYA: Some one million individuals aged 15 and older were found to be suffering from depression, according to the National Health and Morbidity Survey 2023: Non-Communicable Diseases and Healthcare Demand (NHMS).

The survey found that the number of people with depression had doubled from 2019 to 2023, and was prevalent among younger age groups, specifically those aged 16 to 29.

"A total of 4.6% (one million) of adults in Malaysia were found to be suffering from depression," it said

The survey is an annual research activity aimed at gathering information on health and to determine the prevalence of diseases and related risk factors

among Malaysians.

The data collection sessions were conducted from July to September last year, across all walks of life in urban and rural areas nationwide.

As for children afflicted by mental health problems, the findings showed that the number had jumped from 7.9% in 2019 to 16.5% in 2023.

"One in six children aged five to 15 in Malaysia have been affected," it added. THE STAR

A steep bill of health many cannot afford treatment

PETALING JAYA: Over the past year, 12.9% of Malaysians did not seek medical treatment due to financial factors, according to the National Health and Morbidity Survey (NHMS) 2023.

The NHMS 2023 had polled 9,177 persons with a response rate of 26.5% from July 21 to Oct 13 last year.

"Among the respondents who refrained from seeking treatment from healthcare practitioners for their health problems, despite recognising the need for care,

12.9% reported that it was because treatment was too expensive or unaffordable," said the

sive or unaffordable," said the survey.

The survey also noted that there were many public complaints regarding congestion and long waiting times at public hospitals.

According to the NUME 2023

pitals.

According to the NHMS 2023, there was a decline in government facility utilisation from 64.2% in 2019 to 48.9% last year.

"This suggests a notable increase in the utilisation of pri-

vate outpatient services among Malaysians compared with four years ago," said the report.

At the same time, the NHMS 2023 said there was an increase in outpatient utilisation from 8.1% in 2019 to 12.5% last year.

According to the survey, 61.5% of outpatient visits were paid by the patients or their family members.

Some 18.2% of patients had funded their medical expenses through insurance, said the report, while 11.8% of Malaysians

were exempted from medical fees, such as senior citizens and blood donors, among others.

Meanwhile, the NHMS 2023 also said only one in four, or 8.6 million Malaysians, had sought oral healthcare services.

"On average, there were 33 visits per 100 population to a dentist per year in 2023.

"Compared to other countries, the average visits to a dentist reported in a year range from 47 to 160 visits per 100 population," said the NHMS 2023.

Bitter price of sweetness

War against sugar soon in bid to curb NCDs among Malaysians

excessive consumption of sugar will be launched soon aimed at preventing the rise of non-communicable diseases (NCDs) communicable diseases (NCDs) among Malaysians, says Datuk Seri Dr Dzulkefly Ahmad. The Health Minister said several measures were neces-

The Health Minister said several measures were necessary despite reports showing that there have been a decrease in NCDs such as diabetes, hypertension and cholesterol since 2019.

"We will be introducing a grading system on sweetened beverages and premixed drinks... hased on the sugar the drink contains. This is similar to what is being done across the Causeway, where the level of sugar in drinks is graded A, B or C.

"These are the measures we are taking in the war against sugar which is coming soon," he told a press conference after launching of the National Health and Morbidity Survey (NHMS) 2023 and the Global Adult Tobacco Survey (GATS) Malaysia 2023 here yesterday.

Although the prevalence of diabetes had dropped by 2.7% between 2019 and 2023 while hypertension dropped by 0.8%, cholesterol decreased 4.8% within the same period, Dr Dzukelfly pointed out that the prevalence of Malaysians being overweight and obese was on the rise.

"Based on our study, one out of two Malaysians are either over-weight or obese.

"We will be introducing a grading system on sweetened beverages and premixed drinks ... based on the sugar the drink contains."

"We are aware that being obese and overweight carry a higher risk with those affected prone to Type 2 Diabetes.

"Also, being obese and overweight carries the higher risk of developing cancer and also fatty liver," he added.

Obesity and being overweight could drag down our success in reducing NCDs in the coming years, he said.

Dr Dzulkefly said the Health Ministry is also currently engaging with stakeholders including industry players on such strategies on the war against sugar.

He said the sugar grading system for sweetened beverages is a continuation of the government's effort to reduce the consumption of excessive sugar by the public.

However, Dr Dzulkefly did not specify a timeline for the implementation of the sugar grading system.

In 2019, the government introduced a tax on sugary drinks, imposing a 40 sen levy per litre

imposing a 40 sen levy per litre for beverages containing more than five grams of sugar per 100ml and fruit juices with 12 grams of sugar per 100ml.

According to the National Health and Morbidity Survey (NHMS) 2023, there has been a surge in the prevalence of overweight and obesity by nearly 10% between 2011 and last year.

Abdominal obesity among adults also saw an increase of almost 10% for the same period, the survey found.

Meanwhile, speaking on the Global Adult Tobacco Survey (GATS) 2023, the Health Minister expressed serious concern on the rise of the prevalence in the

The Health Ministry's effort to gazette the Smoking Products Control Act for Public Health 2024 Control Act for Public Health 2024 (Act 852) since Feb 2 this year are in line with the key articles outlined under the World Health Organisation Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (WHO FCTC) in efforts to curb the use of tobacco products and reduce the harm caused by smoking and the use of other tobacco.

"We plan to fully enforce Act 852 along with the regulations and orders under it starting from tweether year." he and June this year," he said.

Power feeder pillars to be used for streetlights

Bagaimanu, trend penggunaan perkhidmatan jagaan pesakit luar di fasiliti kerajaan merekodkan penurunan daripada 64.2 peratus pada 2019 kepada 48.9 peratus pada 2023.

Tiga perkara utama perlu dilihat sebelum laksana subsidi bersasar

Saranan ahli ekonomi, pakar perburuhan agar tiada golongan tercicir bantuan

Kuala Lumpur: Kerajaan disyor memastikan sistem kebajikan dan bantuan sosial negara diper-kukuh dan terangkum sebelum mengambil langkah melaksana-kan subsidi secara bersasar.

Ahli ekonomi dan pakar per-buruhan berpendapat, ia antara tiga perkara utama yang perlu dilihat dalam menentukan masa terbaik untuk memperkenalkan rasionalisasi subsidi agar mereka yang terkesan dapat dibantu tanpa ada mana-mana pihak

yang tertinggal. Ketua Ekonomi Pasaran Buruh Ketua Ekonomi Pasaran Buruh di Kementerian Sumber Manusia dan Emiratisasi Emiriah Arab Bersatu (UAE), Prof Madya Dr Mohd Yusof Saari, berkata perkara kedua yang perlu diambil kira ialah melihat kepada ambang pendapatan rakyat teruta-ma mereka bergaji rendah dan sederhana

Pendapatan mereka ini perlu melepasi tahap yang memboleh-kan mereka bertahan dalam keadaan ekonomi di mana kos sara hidup yang tinggi.

"Jika berlaku peningkatan har-ga bahan api apabila subsidi dikurangkan, mereka bukan saha-ja terkesan akibat peningkatan ja terkesan akibat peningkatan harga bahan api, malah harga barangan lain turut meningkat kerana bahan api digunakan dalam proses pengeluaran," katanya kepada BH, semalam.

Beliau diminta mengulas kenyataan Perdana Menteri, Datuk Seri Anwar Ibrahim, kelmarin

bahawa subsidi bersasar bukan untuk menghukum rakyat mis-

kin dan ia hanya akan dilaksa-nakan apabila kerajaan sudah bersedia sepenuhnya.

Dr Mohd Yusuf adalah bekas pensyarah kanan di Jabatan Eko-nomi, Fakulti Ekonomi dan Pengurusan Universiti Putra Ma-laysia (UPM) dan penerima Anu-gerah Akademik Negara 2017. Beliau pernah terbabit dalam 14

projek penyelidikan dan 16 projek perundingan, termasuk Perbada-nan Kuasa Nuklear Malaysia

(MNPC), Institut Penyelidikan Khazanah (KRI) dan Agensi Te-naga Atom Antarabangsa (IAEA).

Persekitaran ekonomi terkawal

Dr Mohd Yusof menambah, perkara ketiga ialah memastikan persekitaran ekonomi perlu kondusif dan terkawal dengan salah satu indikator utama

ketika ini adalah prestasi ringgit.

"Sekiranya ringgit tidak mengukuh dan terus berada di paras melepasi RM4 bagi setiap dolar Amerika Syarikat, ini akan memberi tekanan kos pengeluaran dan

harga barangan.

"Ini tiada kaitan dengan subsidi, namun sekiranya sub-

sidi dikurangkan de-ngan ringgit yang lemah, kesan berganda akan dirasai rakyat,"

Beliau turut menekankan langkah pengurusan subsidi juga per-lu dilakukan berperingkat ber-banding pemotongan mengejut. Katanya, ia bagi membolehkan

masyarakat dan perniagaan menyesuaikan diri dengan perubahan dan mengurangkan sebarang 'kejutan tiba-tiba' kepada ekonomi. "Jangan lakukan secara men-

dadak, beri tempoh masa sesuai supaya pengguna dan pemain industri bersedia sepenuhnya.

"Lakukan secara berperingkat dan dalam tempoh masa yang wajar supaya impak kepada ra-kyat dapat dikurangkan."

dikurangkan.

"Gunakan pendekatan Behaviorial Insight (pendekatan inklusif bagi gubal dasar),
untuk menilai situasi
kerana isu subsidi
adalah isu sensitif, justeru, komunikasi dan

teru, komunikası dan strategi kerajaan per-lu bijak," katanya. Dr Mohd Yusof juga menekankan ketelu-san subsidi perlu di-pertingkatkan bagi membantu orang ra-

mai memahami ke mana subsidi itu pergi dan siapa yang mendapat manfaat daripadanya.

Katanya, perkara itu boleh membantu kerajaan memperoleh sokongan awam untuk usaha pe-murnian subsidi. "Kerajaan juga boleh melak-sanakan pelan diversifikasi prog-

ram subsidi sebagai gantian ke-pada kebergantungan satu jenis

subsidi, contohnya bahan bakar.

"Kepelbagaian program subsidi akan menutup pelbagai keperluan seperti subsidi makanan, kesihatan, pendidikan atau perumahan. Ini boleh membantu memastikan keperluan asas ma-sih terpenuhi sementara mengu-

sih terpenuhi sementara mengurangkan beban subsidi secara keseluruhan," katanya.
Bagi Ketua Ahli Ekonomi Bank Muamalat Malaysia Bhd, Dr Mohd Afzanizam Abdul Rashid, subsidi sedia ada, terutama bahan api banyak beri manfaat kepada golongan berpendapatan tinggi.
Katanya mereka yang berpen-

Katanya, mereka yang berpen-dapatan tinggi banyak menggunakan kenderaan mewah dan merekalah yang banyak menggunarekalah yang banyak menggunakan bahan api berbanding kenderaan digunakan golongan berpendapatan rendah yang kapasiti enjinnya adalah kecil.

"Justeru, perkara ini adalah suatu bentuk ketirisan perlu diperbaiki supaya subsidi diberikan adil dan menepati golongan sasaran," katanya.

Berdasarkan laporan Ketua Audit Negara, subsidi pada 2022 berjumlah RM55 bilion, di mana 82 peratus daripadanya diperun-

82 peratus daripadanya diperun-tukkan bagi menampung subsidi bahan api seperti RON95, diesel dan gas petroleum cecair (LPG).

Gabung penggunaan PADU, AI laksana subsidi bersasar lebih saksama

Subsidi bersasar yang bakal dilaksanakan kerajaan bertujuan bantuan dapat disalurkan dengan lebih efektif kepada golongan benar-benar memerlukan, sambil mengurangkan beban kewangan kerajaan. Langkah ini diharap memberi kesan positif kepada ekonomi negara dengan mengurangkan ketirisan dan penyalahgunaan subsidi.

Bagaimanapun, subsidi bersasar memerlukan penstrukturan semula sistem pengagihan bantuan untuk menjamin keadilan. Dalam hal ini, Perdana Menteri merangkap Menteri Kewangan, Datuk Seri Anwar Ibrahim memberi jaminan pelaksanaan tidak menjejaskan orang miskin.

Bermakna, rakyat juga perlu memahami tujuan dan manfaat pelaksanaan subsidi bersasar. Setakat ini, kerajaan dilaporkan bersedia melaksanakan program subsidi bersasar selepas data dalam sistem Pangkalan Data Utama (PADI) dilaporkan boleh 'dihidupkan' pada bila-bila masa.

Namun, dua senario perlu menjadi pertimbangan kerajaan sebelum mengambil keputusan melaksanakan program subsidi bersasar supaya negara tidak berdepan tekanan inflasi mengejut. Matlamat program subsidi bersasar amat baik bagi mengurangkan ketirisan, namun aspek keadilan dan memenuhi obilgasi sosial, termasuk golongan Mod dan T20 wajar dipertimbang.

Dua golongan ini adalah pembayar cukai konsisten, namun realitinya sering tidak dapat menikmati banyak faedah berbanding golongan B40 dan ke bawah bersandarkan alasan M40 dan T20 lebih berkemampuan.

Hakikatnya, kehidupan golongan berkemampuan ini, terutama M90 turut terkesan akibat kenaikan kos sara hidup. Pelarasan tarif elektrik dan penetapan Kadar Dasar Semingkatkan kos sara hidup golongan terbabit.

Justeru, penggunaan frasa 'M40 dan T20 golongan berkemampuan baji menjustifikasikan golongan B40 dan ke bawah layak menerima segala bantuan kerajaan sewajarnya diperhalus semula untuk keadilan semua pihak dan rakyat. Atas faktor ini, PADU akan digunakan memastikan subsidi bersasar dapat dilaksanakan.

Dalam hal ini, kerajaan wajar mempelbagaikan kaedah menyalurkan subsidi bersasar dapat dilaksanakan.

Silibus AI kenapa tunggu tiga tahun lagi?

KECERDASAN Pintar (AI) semakin menjadi kebiasaan dalam kehidupan rakyat di negara-negara maju di Amerika Syarikat (AS), Eropah, China manakala yang terdekat dengan Malaysia ialah Singapura.

Kerana pentingnya AI negara kota singa itu sudah mema-sukkan silibus AI kepada rakyatnya di peringkat sekolah tadika. Berbanding dengan Malaysia buat masa ini masih di pering-

Berbanding dengan Malaysia buat masa ini masih di pering-kat merancang silibus untuk dilaksanakan pada tahun 2027. Kenapa terlalu lewat walaupun selepas Perdana Menteri, Datuk Seri Anwar Ibrahim menekankan Malaysia perlu menge-rakkan ekosistem AI sepantas mungkin manakala Menteri Pendidikan, Fadhlina Sidek pada sambutan Hari Guru se-malam merancang untuk mendigitalkan guru dan memperka-sakan AI. Menerusi gerakan dan pengumuman kerajaan, AI diakui penting.

diakui penting.

Keperluan AI bukan sahaja bagi memenuhi keperluan pelaburan sebaliknya lebih penting untuk menganjak rakyat lebih celik teknologi yang sedang dimanfaatkan di seluruh dunia. Pelabur Malaysia yang rata-ratanya syarikat dari negaranegara maju sudah tentu mengharapkan prasarana negara ini seiring dengan teknologi bagi membangunkan bisnes mereka agar lebih pantas, jimat dan berkualiti.

Justeru, ada pakar akademik memberi amaran kelewatan melaksanakan silibus AI di sekolah sangat bahaya kerana negara akan terus ketinggalan.

gara akan terus ketinggalan. Bukan sahaja untuk memenuhi keperluan syarikat pelabur tetapi lebih parah generasi baharu negara akan terkebil-ke-bil kerana tidak memahami, menguasai apa lagi mengejar

bil kerana tidak memahami, menguasai apa lagi mengejar perkembangan teknologi seperti negara-negara lain.
Lihat sahaja bagaimana Vietnami, Filipina dan Indonesia yang sebelum ini di belakang Malaysia semakin pantas membangunkan negara masing-masing.
Sedangkan Malaysia dilihat hanya bercakap mengenai AI tetapi gerak kerja ke arah itu tidak pantas. Mengenali AI, teknologi itu berkembang setiap saat. China dan AS berterusan membuat pelaburan besar untuk meningkat keupayaaa AI.
Sebut sahaja bidang apa dari restoran, perubatan, pertanian dan pembankan, AI sedang membantu negara-negara berkenaan beroperasi lebih pantas, menjimatkan masa, menukar sumber manusia dan lebih mengujakan apabila hasil kerjanya lebih berkualiti lagi jitu berbanding dihasilkan manual oleh lebih berkualiti lagi jitu berbanding dihasilkan manual oleh manusia.

Pernah muncul pertimbangan mungkin suatu hari kelak AI bakal menjadi hakim yang akan mengikuti perbicaraan sehingga menjatuhkan hukuman. Dalam bidang perubatan bantuan AI untuk mengesan pelbagai jenis penyakit mahupun pembe-

dahan sedang berlaku. Malah Premier Sarawak baru-baru ini sangat mengharapkan sistem perubatan negara akan diterapkan dengan teknologi AI. Tan Sri Abang Johari Tun Openg yakin menerusi AI lebih ban-yak penyakit mampu dirawat.

Seperti Singapura, hospital di republik itu menggunakan khidmat AI untuk menyaring dan memilih pesakit yang perlu didahulukan untuk diberi rawatan.

didahulukan untuk diberi rawatan.

Melihat betapa hebatnya peranan AI maka silibus teknologi itu perlu dilaksanakan segera bukannya menunggu sehingga 2027. Tanpa AI, Malaysia dikhuatiri dijauhi pelabur manakala penduduknya pula dikelaskan sebagai 'mundur' kerana tidak sepadan dengan penduduk dunia lain yang dilingkari AI.

Jadi, ayuh Malaysia termasuk ibu bapa tolong buka minda dan bebaskan emosi bagi memberi laluan kepada perkembangan AI dan bukan lagi terlalu fokus di WhatsApp hanya untuk berdiskusi mengenai gelagat anak-anak di sekolah seperti isu berebut pensil, tarik rambut dan siapa budak itu atau kenapa budak itu ambil buku anak saya. Sekarang bukan zaman melayan perkara-perkara yang tidak memberi pulangan.

Dr. Dzulkelly berkata, kajian GATS 2023 menunjukkan peningkatan peratus pengguna rokok elektronik atau vape yang amat ketara terutama dalam kalangan orang dewasa yang berusia kurang 50 tahun.

Menurut kajian itu, penggunaan rokok elektronik di Malaysia meningkat sehingga 600 peratus dengan 5.8 peratus pengguna pada tahun lalu berbanding hanya 0.8 peratus pada tahun 2011.

Pengguna rokok elektronik
berumur 15 hingga 24 tahun menunjukkan peningkatan drastik
daripada 1.1 peratus pada tahun
2011 kepada 8.6 peratus pada tahun lalu.

Selain itu, dwipengguna (tembakau dan rokok elektronik) turut meningkat daripada 0.8 peratus pada 2011 kepada 3.9 peratus pada 2023 iaitu peningkatan hampir 400 peratus.

Malaysia's inflation in 2023 slows to 2.5%



Main groups show rises, except for communication subsector

PETALING JAYA: Malaysia's inflation in 2023 recorded a slower increase of 2.5% (2022: 3.3%) with the price index at 130.4 points as against 127.2 points in the previous year, according to the Department of Statistics

Malaysia. Inflation for the main groups showed an increase except for communication (-3%). The highest increase was recorded by restaurants & hotels at 5.6%. This was followed by food & beverages (4.8%); miscellaneous goods & services (2.4%); furnishings, household equipment & routine household maintenance (2.3%); health (2.2%); education (1.9%); housing, water, electricity, gas & other fuels (1.7%); recreation services & culture (1.5%); transport (1.1%); alcoholic beverages & tobacco (0.6%); and clothing & footwear (0.3%).

In a statement yesterday, Chief

In a statement yesterday, Chief Statistician Malaysia Datuk Seri Dr Mohd Uzir Mahidin said, "The slower increase of inflation in 2023 was in tandem with the decline in most global commodity prices, the easing of supply disruptions, price controls and the provision of subsidies for selected goods. Despite a decrease in energy commodity prices in 2023 (-29.9%) compared to 2022 (60.0%), the price of this commodity is still higher compared to prepandemic levels."

He added that the increase in fuel costs and dependence on imported liquefied

He added that the increase in fuel costs and dependence on imported liquefied natural gas (LNG) has prompted the government to adjust electricity tariffs under the implementation of the Imbalance Cost Pass-Through mechanism for users in Peninsular Malaysia for the period of July 1, 2023, to Dec 31, 2023.


Domestic users with electricity consumption units exceeding 1,500kWh will be imposed a surcharge of 10 sen/kWh, he said.

Other initiatives provided by the government can be directly seen through the Payung Rahmah initiative which includes Menu Rahmah, Pakej Rahmah and Menu Sisua Rahmah. These initiatives target the low-income group and the hardcore poor. Other than that, the government has spent almost RMB billion on Sumbangan Tunai Rahmah, which has benefited 8.7 million Malaysians.

group which is the largest component of household spending in Malaysia with a contribution of 29.5% of total Consumer Price Index weight started to ease to 4.8% compared with 5.8% in the preceding

The slower increase of this group is largely due to a slower rise in the food at home component which went up 3.5% compared with 5.3% recorded in 2022. Food away from home increased of 6.7% compared with the previous year (6.6%).

Inflation of restaurants & hotels recorded an increase of 5.6% in 2023 against 5% in 2022. The subgroup for expenditure in restaurants & cafes increased by 5.5% compared with 5.3% in 2022.

In addition, the subgroup of accommodation

services recorded a significant increase of 5.5% in 2023 compared with 3.7% in 2022. Inflation of hotels increased to 5.8% as against 4.1%

hotels increased to 5.8% as against 4.1% recorded in 2022.
However, inflation of transport recorded a slower increase of 1.1% in 2023 compared with 2022 (4.7%), mainly due to the subgroup of operation of personal transport equipment which moderated to 0.8% compared with 5.8% in 2022.

The average price of unleaded petrol RON97 declined to RM3.39 per litre from RM3.97 per litre in 2022, in tandem with the drop in the average price of world Brent crude oil. The average prices of unleaded petrol RON95 and diesel remained at RM2.05 per litre and RM2.15 per litre respectively.

Identify trees solution suitable for urban areas, dept told

PUTRAJAYA: The National Landscape Department has been instructed to identify tree species suitable for planting in urban areas and not hazardous to the public, said Housing and Local Government Minister Nga Kor Ming "We discussed the issue during"

"We discussed the issue during Wednesday's Cabinet meeting and that the department need to take the relevant steps soon, Nga said after the pre-launch ceremony of National Landscape Day 2024 on Wednesday.

The media reported that Prime Minister Datuk Seri Anwar Ibrahim had ordered the planting of 100 trees for every unnecessary tree felled in Kuala Lumpur.

Nga said for the first time the King would grace the National Landscape Day.

Nga said His Majesty Sultan Ibrahim, King of Malaysia, has consented to officiate at the opening of the National Landscape Day 2024 on May 25 at Taman Tasik Shah Alam in Selangor.

Nga added that the event, from May 24 to June 2, would serve as a platform for landscape industry players to promote and market their products. – Bernama
