Kuala Lumpur: Seramai 411 warga Polis Diraja Malaysia (PDRM) dikenal pasti mengalami masalah kesihatan mental berikutan beban tugas yang ditanggung.

Pengarah Jabatan Integriti dan Pematuhan Standard (Jips) Bukit Aman Datuk Seri Azri Ahmad berkata, angka itu diperoleh menerusi kajian pihaknya pada 2022 dan 2023.

Menurutnya, PDRM adalah sebuah pasukan penguat kuasa undang-undang yang mempunyai keanggotaan ramai dengan cara kerja tiada henti untuk 24 jam sehari.

"Pegawai polis berurusan secara langsung dengan masyarakat dan di dalam masa sama mereka juga adalah ahli masyara-

Itu tindakan pengusaha kolam pancing di Klang Utara di sini, hingga mekerugian ngakibatkan RM110,000 kepada Pengurusan Air Selangor Sdn Bhd (Air Selangor).

Kegiatan pemilik premis bagaimanapun dibongkar Suruhanjaya Perkhidmatan Air Negara (Span) dengan kerjasama Air Selangor membabitkan kegiatan penyambungan bekalan air secara tidak sah.

Pengarah Unit Komunikasi dan Hal Ehwal Pengguna, Mohd Fazil Ismail SPAN berkata, penyambu-

ngan bekalan air secara tidak sah itu dipercayai dilakukan sejak setahun lalu membabitkan penggunaan air sebanyak 37,000 meter kubik.

"Span mendapati terdapat pengambilan air tidak sah melalui saluran tidak bermeter dengan menggunakan paip berukuran 25 milimeter (mm) secara terus kepada paip utama Air Selangor.

"Siasatan mendapati semalam. sambungan yang disyaki tidak sah ini menyalurkan bekalan air ke dalam premis kolam pancing dan dipercayai digunakan untuk tujuan aktiviti harian mereka.

"Penyambungan secara tidak sah ini menyebabkan kos kerugian Air Selangor dianggarkan sekitar RM110,000 yang mana panjang paip sambungan tidak sah ini sepanjang 70 meter melangkaui dua kolam.

"Berdasarkan tinjauan yang dilakukan oleh Air Selangor dan ujian klorin dibuat, air yang dicuri itu adalah air dirawat milik Air Selangor," katanya ketika menjalankan operasi penguatkuasaan mengejut itu

Mohd Fazil berkata, pihaknya mengambil masa kira-kira enam bulan bagi menjalankan risikan selain aduan penduduk yang berdepan masalah tekanan air rendah

"Premis akan disiasat kan ke atas mengikut Seksyen 123(1) Akta Industri Perkhidmatan Air 2006 (Akta 655) yang mana siasatan lanjut akan dilakukan oleh pihak SPAN.

"Di bawah peruntukan undang-undang Seksyen 123(1) Akta Industri Perkhidmatan Air 2006 (Akta 655), tiada seorang pun selain pemegang lesen boleh membuat apa-apa sambungan ke suatu sesalur utama awam atau paip air perkhidmatan.

"Jika disabitkan tertuduh, boleh didenda tidak melebihi RM100,000 atau dipenjarakan selama tempoh tidak melebihi satu tahun atau kedua-duanya seperti yang diperuntukkan di bawah Seksyen 123(3) dalam Akta yang sama," katanya.

PENCEMARAN BAU DI SUNGAI KUNDANG, SUNGAI SEMBAH

Dua ditahan 26/7 bantu siasatan M

Putrajaya: Dua individu ditahan Jabatan Alam Sekitar (Jas) bagi membantu siasatan kes pencemaran bau di Sungai Kundang dan Sungai Sembah mengakibatkan henti tugas Loji Rawatan Air (LRA) Rantau Panjang, Sungai Selangor SSP 1, 2 dan 3.

Ketua Pengarah Alam Sekitar, Datuk Wan Abdul Latiff Wan Jaffar berkata, susulan insiden pencemaran bau itu, Jas menjalankan siasatan terhadap premis yang disyaki iaitu memproses bahan akrilik di kawasan perindustrian Jalan Kampung Orang Asli, Kuang, Rawang, Selangor.

"Hasil pemeriksaan mendapati punca pencemaran bau akibat kebocoran bahan kimia dikenali sebagai *Poly Metha Acrylic Acid* (PMAA) daripada tangki penstoran yang juga produk dihasilkan premis itu berbentuk cecair," katanya, semalam.

Beliau berkata, tumpahan produk itu akhirnya melimpah ke longkang premis bersebelahan sehingga longkang jalan besar dan seterusnya ke Sungai Kuang.

"Aliran Sungai Kuang akan memasuki Sungai Kundang kemudiannya ke Sungai Sembah dan seterusnya memasuki Sungai Selangor. Kebocoran bahan kimia berkenaan telah menyebabkan pelepasan bau kerana ciri-ciri bahan kimia PMAA yang berbau kuat dan tengik," katanya.

ira-kira 1,500 usahawan di Selangor menyertai Program Bizmatch Mega PKNS yang berlangsung di Dewan Raja Muda Musa, Seksyen 7 di sini pada Selasa.

Program anjuran Perbadanan Kemajuan Negeri Selangor (PKNS) di bawah Bahagian Pembangunan Usahawan (BPU) itu merupakan penganjuran edisi kedua sejak

diperkenalkan tahun lepas. Timbalan Ketua Pegawai Eksekutif (Korporat) PKNS, Suhaimi Kasdon berkata, program itu menjadi platform kepada usahawan untuk memperkukuhkan rangkaian dan memajukan bisnes melalui padanan perniagaan.

Seorang lagi usahawan, Asraff Rosli, 36, berkata, produk BS Fitness Nutrition diusahakan sejak 2018 berpeluang untuk diperkembangkan lagi dalam pasaran menerusi platform Bizmatch Mega PKNS.

"Saya datang untuk melihat agensi yang dapat membantu dari segi pembiayaan untuk mengembangkan lagi kapasiti pengeluaran produk untuk memenuhi pasaran eksport.

"Saya merupakan usahawan kelahiran "Saya merupakan usahawan kelahiran PKNS yang banyak memberi bimbingan dan peluang menghadiri program pemasaran keluar negara hingga mendapat potensi pembeli antarabangsa," katanya.

1,671 polis dipecat dalam 10 tahun

Dikenakan hukuman tatatertib kerana pelbagai salah laku

eramai 1,671 pegawai dan anggota Polis Diraja Malaysia (PDRM) dibuang kerja dalam tempoh 10 tahun.

Pengarah Jabatan Integriti dan Pematuhan Standard (JIPS) Bukit Aman, Datuk Seri Azri Ahmad berkata, sejak penubuhan jabatan pada tahun 2014, JIPS telah membuka dan melaksanakan siasatan melibatkan sebanyak 40,436 Kertas Siasatan Tatatertib (KST) dan Kertas Enkuiri Tatatertib (KET).

Menurutnya, seramai 15,546

pegawai dan anggota telah dijatuhkan dengan pelbagai hukuman tatatertib.

"Daripada jumlah itu, seramai 1,671 daripadanya dijatuhkan hukuman buang kerja.

"Siasatan tatatertib yang telus dan tindakan punitif sebegini adalah antara

pendekatan kepada kesungguhan PDRM mengawal salah laku warga pasukan," katanya sempena Majlis Sambutan 1 Dekad Penubuhan JIPS di Bukit Aman di sini pada Khamis.

Beliau berkata, Cawangan Risikan Operasi JIPS yang berperanan utama sebagai unit pengesanan dan pengesahan juga telah melaksanakan operasi serta membuat tangkapan ke atas 798 orang pegawai polis yang

dipercayai terlibat dengan pelbagai kesalahan seperti jenayah, perjudian, dadah dan mengunjungi pusat hiburan.

Tambahnya, bagi pelaksanaan teras pematuhan, dari masa ke masa seramai 10,000 hingga 20,000 warga PDRM dipantau dan diperiksa secara langsung oleh Cawangan

Pematuhan JIPS Bukit Aman. "Sepanjang tahun 2023 sahaja secara keseluruhan seramai 19,352 pegawai dan anggota diperiksa dan seramai 1,396 dikesan melakukan pelbagai salah

laku.

"Bagi tempoh enam bulan tahun ini setakat Jun, 689 pegawai dan anggota dikesan melakukan pelbagai salah laku hasil pemeriksaan 11,221 individu," jelasnya.

Tiga tahap penilaian pokok berisiko

KUALA LUMPUR - Dewan Bandaraya Kuala Lumpur (DBKL) mempunyai mekanisme pemantauan berkala terhadap pokok-pokok yang dikenal pasti berisiko dan berusia khususnya di

jajaran jalan raya utama ibu kota.

Menteri di Jabatan Perdana Menteri (Wilayah Persekutuan), Dr Zaliha Mustafa berkata, penilai-an pokok berisiko mempunyai tiga peringkat iaitu tahap satu melibatkan non-arborist membuat pemeriksaan pokok melalui penilaian visual berdasarkan pengalaman kerja dan pengetahuan dalam bidang arborikultur.

"Tahap dua ialah melalui Visual Tree Assesment (VTA) yang dilaksanakan oleh arborist bertauliah dengan menggunakan standard ditetapkan oleh International Society of Arboriculture (ISA).

"Tahap tiga pula merupakan penilaian terhadap keadaan struktur pokok menggunakan peralatan khas yang dinamakan *resistrograph* dan menggunakan khidmat *tree climber* untuk membuat penilaian di setiap bahagian atas pokok," katanya.

Beliau berkata, penilaian dan pemeriksaan pokok bagi tahap satu dijalankan setiap 10 bulan manakala bagi tahap dua dan tiga, ia dilaksanakan di lokasi mempunyai sejarah kegagalan pokok dan pokok berusia yang berisiko tinggi.

Menurutnya, ia termasuk bagi pokok-pokok di lokasi berfrekuensi tinggi berdasarkan penggunaan orang awam dan kawasan padat dengan

harta benda berharga.

Zaliha berkata, pemeriksaan VTA yang dilakukan oleh DBKL membolehkan kesihatan dan kesuburan bahagian pokok yang tidak boleh dilihat seperti bahagian akar, batang dan silara pokok diperiksa secara komprehensif dan terperinci.

Beliau berkata demikian ketika menjawab soalan Senator Datuk Mohd Hisamudin Yahaya mengenai bentuk pemantauan berkala oleh DBKL terhadap pokok berisiko dan berusia di ibu kota.

Sementara itu, Zaliha berkata, pihaknya juga telah mengenal pasti spesies pokok yang boleh ditanam bagi menggantikan pokok-pokok berisiko. - Bernama

Menurutnya, pengiktirafan berganda itu memberi impak besar dalam merevolusikan pengurusan sisa dan penerimaan positif orang awam, sekali gus menjadi bukti kecemerlangan serta kepercayaan pengguna.

"ATDReC pula diiktiraf sebagai Penyedia Perkhidmatan Kitar Semula Paling Inovatif. Ini menunjukkan usaha perintis dalam sektor kitar semula dan komitmen kami memacu perubahan positif melalui penyelesaian inovatif.

Ketua Pegawai Eksekutif Rapid Bus, Muhammad Yazurin Sallij berkata, idea perkhidmatan DRT ini tercipta bertujuan menyelesaikan rungutan pengguna apabila perjalanan bas perantara mengambil masa yang lama untuk sampai ke destinasi.

Beliau menambah, ia juga susulan sesetengah pengguna yang menggunakan pengangkutan awam tidak gemar untuk menggunakan perkhidmatan bas perantara atau feeder bus

"Hampir 90 peratus daripada bas perantara Rapid KL dilapor tiba dengan waktu tepat dalam mengambil penumpang di stesen Transit Aliran Ringan (LRT) dan stesen Transit Aliran Massa (MRT). dioperasikan oleh pihak yang ketiga dengan menggunakan jenama dan sistem yang sama sebagaimana yang digunakan Rapid KL," katanya.

Beliau juga berharap, bas penyumberan luar ini dapat menampung jumlah kekurangan jumlah bas agar operasi dapat dijalankan mengikut jadual

"Bas penyumberan luar ini telah bermula pada 1 Jun lalu dengan 12 buah bas dan akan ditambah jumlah bas sehingga Disember. "Sebelum Disember ini, kita

akan pastikan terdapat 164 bas yang beroperasi dan 60 daripadanya adalah gantian bas yang terpaksa ditarik atas faktor bas melebihi jangka hayat yang sesuai untuk operasi.

"Saya juga berharap menjelang akhir tahun, terdapat tambahan lebih 100 buah bas di Kuala Lumpur dan 80 buah van untuk DRT bag melancarkan perjalanan pengguna yang menggunakan pengangkutan awam," katanya.

Dalam pada itu, Muhammad Yazurin juga berkongsi pengalaman pahit dan manis sepanjang 13 tahun berkhidmat dalam sektor pengangkutan awam bersempena dengan ulang tahun yang ke-20 Rapid KL

"Saya tidak akan lupa tentang kesiapsiagaan petugas dalam memberi bantuan perkhidmatan bas shuttle oleh Rapid Bus kepada para penumpang yang berkesan sewaktu 16 stesen Kelana Jaya

"Betapa cekapnya barisan petugas sehingga tiada masa rehat dalam menguruskan masalah ini bagi memastikan penumpang dapat menggunakan perkhidmatan awam dengan baik untuk ke tempat kerja," ujarnya.

411 warga polis alami masalah mental akibat beban tugas

KUALA LUMPUR: Polis Diraja Malaysia (PDRM) mengenal pasti 411 warganya mengalami masalah kesihatan mental berikutan beban tugas yang ditanggung,

Pengarah Jabatan Integriti dan Pematuhan Standard (JIPS) Bukit Aman, Datuk Seri Azri Ahmad berkata, angka itu diperolehi menerusi kajian pihaknya pada tahun 2022 dan 2023. Menurut beliau, PDRM adalah sebuah pasukan penguat kuasa undang-undang yang mempunyai keanggotaan yang ramai dengan 'nature of work' yang tiada henti untuk 24 jam sehari.

"Pegawai polis berurusan secara langsung dengan masyarakat dan di dalam masa sama mereka juga adalah ahli masyarakat yang perlu meneruskan hidup yang serba mencabar.

"Sebagai manusia biasa warga PDRM juga tidak terkecuali daripada terkesan dengan isu kesihatan mental ekoran tekanan kerja dan tuntutan untuk memenuhi keperluan hidup yang tinggi," katanya dalam ucapan Sambutan Satu Dekad Penubuhan JIPS di Bukit Aman, di sini semalam.

Beliau berkata, pegawai polis sukar untuk menghindarkan diri daripada terjerumus kepada rasuah, salah guna kuasa dan jenayah lainnya kerana ruang dan peluang yang hadir tanpa henti.

Kata beliau, JIPS akan sentiasa bersedia melaksanakan peranan dan tanggungjawabnya sebagai Pengurus Integriti Warga PDRM.

"Namun begitu, jabatan ini tidak mungkin mampu merubah apa yang ada melainkan mendapat sokongan daripada semua pihak.

"Tidak terkecuali sokongan padu daripada masyarakat, untuk menjadikan PDRM kekal sebagai sebuah agensi penguatkuasa ulung negara yang dipercayai dan disegani di seluruh dunia," jelasnya.

KUALA LUMPUR: Negara mempunyai pakar untuk menangani serangan siber dalam pelbagai bentuk termasuk cubaan mengganggu dan mengintip sistem pertahanan negara.

Menteri Pertahanan, Datuk Seri Mohamed Khaled Nordin mengakui serangan siber ke atas sistem pertahanan negara terus berlaku dan turut menjadi ancaman kepada sektor lain.

"Yang penting ketika ini adalah kita perlu ada kekuatan dan kemampuan untuk menanganinya," katanya kepada pemberita selepas Majlis Menandatangani Memorandum Persefahaman 66

Ia mungkin terus meningkat dan tentunya satu fenomena yang dihadapi di mana-mana. Yang penting ketika ini adalah kita perlu ada kekuatan dan kemampuan untuk menanganinya."

MOHAMED KHALED NORDIN

Sementara itu, mengulas mengenai pemakluman daripada Jawatankuasa Kira-Kira Wang Negara (PAC) yang akan memanggilnya bagi prosiding Lembaga Tabung Angkatan Tentera (LTAT), dijadualkan pada Ogos depan, beliau mengesahkan sudah menerima hal tersebut.

"Prosiding ini akan bincangkan perkara yang dibangkitkan oleh Laporan Ketua Audit Negara (LKAN) untuk tahun 2022," katanya.

Selangor sumbang pelaburan terbesar negara

KUALA LUMPUR: Selangor optimis untuk mengekalkan prestasinya sebagai antara penyumbang pelaburan terbesar negara menerusi penganjuran Sidang Kemuncak Perniagaan Antarabangsa Selangor 2024 (SIBC 2024), kata Menteri Besar Selangor, Amirudin Shari.

Beliau berkata, bagi suku pertama tahun ini, Selangor berada di tempat ketiga dengan pelaburan sebanyak RM12 bilion.

Menurutnya, tahun lepas, Selangor berada di tempat kedua

mencatat RM55 bilon secara keseluruhan.

"Jadi, sasaran kali ini untuk mengekalkan jumlah pelaburan besar dan mencipta peluang ekonomi signifikan kepada rakyat.

"Melalui SIBC ini, ia menjadi peluang ekonomi Selangor dan Malaysia untuk berkembang dan ruang kepada pempamer ke arah pintu gerbang Asean," katanya kepada pemberita selepas perasmian pembukaan SIBC 2024 di Pusat Konvensyen Kuala Lumpur, semalam.

SIBC sesi pertama akan berlangsung serentak menghimpunkan lebih 285 pempamer termasuk dari negara luar.

Mengulas lanjut, Amirudin berkata, pihak menjemput delegasi ASEAN setiap untuk membincangkan fungsi dan potensi pelaburan serantau termasuk Malaysia.

Jelas beliau, terdapat 'mega trend' yang berkait dengan Malaysia antaranya di Selangor sendiri membabitkan digitalisasi, tenaga hijau yang semua itu telah dimasukkan di dalam kerangka Rancangan Selangor Pertama (RS1).

"Oleh itu, tumpuan kita mahu menarik pelabur datang ke Malaysia khususnya Selangor selain membuka ruang kepada negerinegeri lain mencipta peluang ekonomi.

"Contohnya, sektor industri bukan hanya di Selangor tetapi Negeri Sembilan dan Kedah turut hadir mempamerkan kawasan baharu yang mereka sasarkan sebagai kawasan industri," katanya.

Amirudin berkata, pihaknya gembira dapat berkongsi peluang pelaburan dengan negeri lain.

"Ini termasuk negeri Pahang, Melaka dan Johor dalam mempamerkan terutama tempat strategik untuk pelaburan.

"Ia bukan hanya pameran barang perniagaan tetapi pameran kepada sokongan terhadap industri, pelaburan dalam negeri-negeri dan Selangor serta Malaysia," katanya.

1,671 pegawai, anggota polis dibuang kerja dalam tempoh 10 tahun

Kuala Lumpur: Seramai 1,671 pegawai dan anggota polis dikenakan hukuman buang kerja atas pelbagai kesalahan sejak 2014 hingga Jun tahun ini, kata Pengarah Jabatan Integriti dan Pematuhan Standard (JIPS) Bukit Aman, Datuk Seri Azri Ahmad.

Beliau berkata, dalam tempoh itu juga 15,546 pegawai dan anggota dikenakan pelbagai hukuman tatatertib dan Polis Diraja Malaysia (PDRM) juga membuka serta melaksanakan siasatan membabitkan 40,436 kertas siasatan tatatertib (KST) dan kertas enkuiri tatatertib (KET).

"Bagi pelaksanaan teras pematuhan, dari semasa ke semasa kira-kira 10,000 hingga 20,000 petugas dipantau dan diperiksa secara langsung oleh Cawangan Pematuhan JIPS selaku badan pemerhati," katanya ketika berucap pada sambutan satu dekad penubuhan JIPS di Ibu pejabat Polis Bukit Aman, di

sini, semalam.

Azri berkata, keutamaan pemantauan adalah ke atas petugas barisan hadapan yang berurusan secara langsung dengan masyarakat, iaitu bagi memastikan mereka melak-

sanakan tugas dengan mematuhi undang-undang, peraturan, arahan dan prosedur operasi standard

"Pegawai yang dikesan melakukan salah laku akan diambil tindakan sewajarnya.

"Prinsip asasnya, semakin kerap pemeriksaan dibuat, semakin tinggi tahap pencegahan," katanya.

Azri berkata, sepanjang tahun lalu 19,352 pegawai dan anggota diperiksa dengan 1,396 dikesan melakukan pelbagai kesalahan salah laku, manakala bagi

tahun ini pula 11,221 pegawai dan anggota diperiksa tempoh Januari hingga Jun lalu dengan 689 orang dikesan melakukan pelbagai salah laku.

Katanya, Cawangan Risikan dan Operasi JIPS yang

berperanan utama sebagai unit pengesahan juga melaksanakan ribuan operasi dan membuat tangkapan ke atas 798 orang pegawai polis yang dipercayai terbabit dengan pelbagai kesalahan seperti judi, dadah dan kunjungan ke pusat hiburan yang tidak wajar.

Dalam tempoh 10 tahun, beliau berkata, JIPS menerima serta mengendalikan hampir 50,000 aduan dan maklumat khasnya berkaitan isu rasuah, salah guna kuasa dan seumpamanya. BERNAMA

Pindaan Akta Audit 1957 beri impak positif urus

Pindaan Akta Audit 1957 akan memberi impak positif melalui skop pengauditan terhadap pengurusan wang awam, di samping memastikan syor audit sentiasa diberi perhatian serius dan diambil tindakan sewajarnya oleh semua pihak sama ada kementerian, jabatan, agensi kerajaan serta mana-mana badan, termasuk syarikat yang menerima wang awam.

Jabatan Audit Negara dalam kenyataan semalam, berkata Akta Audit 1957 (Akta 62) sedia ada tidak dipinda sejak 1991 dan perlu diperkasakan selaras dengan perkembangan terkini yang menyentuh aspek tatakelola dan pengurusan wang awam.

Katanya, ia bertujuan memperkasakan peranan Ketua Audit Negara dalam memastikan fungsi semak dan imbang melalui tiga pengauditan utama, iaitu pengauditan penyata kewangan, pengauditan penyata kewangan, pengauditan penyata kewangan, pengauditan penyata kewangan, terkini yiti kementerian/jabatan/agensi kerajaan serta pengauditan pengurusan syarikat kerajaan.

"Pindaan Akta 62 membabit kan lima prinsip pindaan kepada peruntukan sedia ada seperti pengauditan badan lain, termasuk syarikat di mana kerajaan mempunyai kepentingan dalam bentuk jaminan kewangan.

"Selain itu, pengauditan melalui pendekatan Follow The Public Money Audit, tertakluk kepada Menteri Kewangan atas dasar kepentingan awam.

"Seterusnya, mewujudkan suatu peruntukan baharu mesenai kuasa Ketua Audit Negara untuk mengeluarkan apa-apa garis panduan yang perlu dan sesuai manfaat bagi menjalankan peruntukan Akta 62," katanya.

Selain itu, katanya, antara prinsip pindaan terbabit juga termasuk kuasa Ketua Audit Negara untuk mengeluarkan apa-apa garis panduan yang berlaku dalam pengakaunan atau penjagaan wang diambil oleh Persekutuan, negeri, pihak berkuasa awam atau badan yang ditentukan," katanya.

RUU Audit (Pindaan) 2024 bertujuan mengukuhkan akta melalui peruntukan baharu selaras dengan keperluan kehendak semasa dan peluasan bidang tugas Ketua Audit Negara, kelmarin.

Serangan siber dalam sistem su pertahanan meningkat

Kuala Lumpur: Serangan siber ke atas sistem pertahanan negara dikesan meningkat serta berlaku secara berterusan, di samping turut mengancam pelbagai sektor lain.

Menteri Pertahanan, Datuk Seri Mohamed Khaled Nordin, berkata ia termasuk percubaan mengganggu ketenteraman dan mengintip tindakan atau strategi semasa sistem pertahanan negara yang perlu ditangani dengan pantas.

"Ya, serangan siber berlaku secara berterusan. Ia mungkin terus meningkat dan tentunya fenomena yang dihadapi di mana-mana, baik aspek pertahanan mahupun sektor lain.

"Kita perlu ada kekuatan dan kemampuan untuk menanganinya," katanya kepada media selepas majlis menandatangani memorandum persefahaman (MoU) antara UiTM Energy & Facilities Sdn Bhd dan Boustead Petroleum Marketing Sdn Bhd (BHPetrol) di sini, semalam.

Sebelum ini, sistem pertahanan negara dilapor menerima 3,000 serangan siber setiap hari selepas Malaysia menyatakan sokongan terhadap Palestin.

Serangan membabitkan pelbagai pihak yang bukan hanya bertujuan mengintip pergerakan Malaysia, tetapi juga menggodam sistem pertahanan negara.

Mengenai langkah menangani ancaman berkenaan, Mohamed Khaled berkata, kementerian mempunyai pakar berkemahiran dalam teknologi terkini, selain kerap mengenal pasti dan menguasai teknologi baharu.

"Kita kena tahu teknologi baharu dan bagaimana serangan berlaku kerana ia bukan dalam bentuk tradisional semata-mata," katanya.

Penguatkuasaan, hukuman berat bendung jenayah siber

Kuala Lumpur: Kerajaan digesa melihat semula penguatkuasaan dan hukuman terhadap pihak yang terbabit dalam serangan siber.

Penganalisis jenayah, Shahul Hamid Abdul Rahim, berkata penguatkuasaan lebih ketat dan hukuman berat perlu terhadap penjenayah yang terbabit dalam serangan menerusi media so-

"Kerajaan perlu beri perhatian memandangkan jenayah siber di negara ini amat serius dan semakin rumit. Negara ada undang-undang, peraturan dan hukuman, namun jika penguatkuasaan tidak dijalankan dengan serius, ancaman kepada negara akan terus berlaku.

"Akta Keselamatan Siber diwujudkan dan masih baharu, jadi saya tidak nampak secara serius kita menggunakan akta terbabit," katanya pada program Ruang Bicara terbitan Bernama

TV, malam kelmarin.

Beliau menegaskan undangundang berkaitan dilihat semula, sama ada sudah memadai atau perlu ditambah baik bagi menjadi satu akta yang benarbenar mampu menangani jenavah siber.

"Sebagai contoh baru-baru ini, netizen tidak puas hati terhadap hukuman denda maksimum RM100 yang dikenakan

kebajikan atas pertuduhan dengan sengaja mengeluarkan kata-kata kesat sehingga menyebabkan kematian seorang pempengaruh. Hal ini kerana ia membabitkan maruah orang." katanya.

Perkukuh tetapan sekuriti

Sementara itu, Timbalan Pengarah (Pengurusan Strategik) Fakulti Sains Komputer dan kepada seorang pemilik rumah Teknologi Maklumat, Univer-

siti Putra Malaysia, Profesor Madya Dr Nur Izura Udzir, berkata pengguna media sosial perlu berhati-hati mengendalikan platform itu dengan memperkukuh tetapan sekuriti dan privasi bagi menangani jenayah siber.

Beliau berkata, mereka perlu mengambil langkah kawalan seperti menggunakan verifikasi dua langkah, cap jari, pengecaman wajah serta nombor pas pengesahan transaksi (OTP).

"Pengguna perlu berhati-hati, berasa curiga dan jangan mudah terpedaya memandangkan terlalu banyak penipuan seperti scam, buli siber vang berkongsi kandungan sensitif serta bersifat menghasut.

"Selain mengemas kini tetapan media sosial, pengguna juga perlu mengemas kini pengetahuan isu semasa.

"Mereka juga dinasihati untuk elak menekan pautan tidak yakin dan sahih yang mempunyai fail aplikasi (APK), iaitu kod yang boleh menceroboh peranti serta memudahkan penyangak siber," katanya kepada


Beliau berkata, aplikasi media sosial seperti WhatsApp dan Telegram perlu lebih bertanggungjawab serta memberikan komitmen yang serius untuk menyediakan platform selamat kepada pengguna dengan mengawal kandungan dan hantaran.

"Mereka perlu memberi komitmen serius untuk membanteras jenavah komersial, kanakkanak dan sosial yang boleh digunakan seperti pornografi, penggunaan dadah dan cetak rompak.

"Penvedia media sosial perlu ambil serius kerana perkara ini sebahagian daripada tanggungjawab sosial dan jangan hanya memikirkan keuntungan semata-mata," katanya.

THE DIFFERENCES BETWEEN SMOKE, VAPOUR AND AEROSOL

Reassessing accessibility to ensure effective tobacco control methods and policies

ACCORDING to the Global Adult Tobacco Survey (GATS) Malaysia 2023, the number of e-cigarette users in Malaysia has increased dramatically over the past 12

The prevalence of e-cigarette use among those aged 15-24 increased from 1.1% in 2011 to 8.6% in 2023, representing a

8.6% in 2023, representing a 600% rise.

Meanwhile, the overall rate of e-cigarette use in the country has also surged, going from 0.8% in 2011 to 5.8% in 2023 - more than a six-fold increase.

The survey found that 68.1% of Malaysin adults are survey of

of Malaysian adults are aware of e-cigarettes, and 8.9% (10.5% of men, 0.8% of women) have used

This uptake could be due to inadequate information regarding vapes, e-cigarettes and other alternative tobacco products – how they are distinct and why they should be regulated accord-

What's in aerosols?

While smoke is technically an aerosol, not all aerosols are cre-

ated equal.

Smoke is a complex mixture of solid particles and thousands of chemicals generated at high temperatures when a material

By contrast, an aerosol formed at lower temperatures through vaporisation and condensation is much simpler and contains far fewer harmful chemicals.

This also means that e-ciga-rettes do not use tobacco - they vaporise an e-liquid solution containing nicotine and flavours when used. Since there is no burning

involved, neither heat-not-burn products nor vapes produce ash or smoke. Instead, they use heat-ing systems to generate an aero-sol inhaled by users, classifying heated tobacco products and vapes as "smoke-free" alterna-

Based on Philip Morris International's (PMI) research, heated tobacco products' (HTP) aerosol contains significantly fewer harmful chemicals comtewer harmful chemicals com-pared to cigarette smoke—a claim supported by both target-ed and untargeted analyses con-ducted by the company. These additional compounds are likely attributed to the fla-your system used in HTPs. A tox-icological evaluation concluded

icological evaluation concluded that these additional compounds do not pose any additional haz-ard compared to cigarette smoke

PMI Project Management and PMI Project Management and Knowledge Integration manager Mark Bentley highlighted the significant differences between the two, emphasising the reduced presence of harmful chemicals in heated tobacco aer-

From the list of more than 100 harmful and potential harmful constituents (HPHCs), various governments and regulatory bodies have compiled



Smoke from combustion is the primary reason for harmful constituents in cigarettes as it generates thousands of chemicals and solid particles that are linked to various health issues

priority lists of toxicants that require measurement in cigarequire measurement in cigarette smoke. The most comprehensive list is by the [United States] Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and their list of 93 constituents.

"PMI has analysed, using targeted methods, the concentrations of these 93 constituents in cigarette smoke versue heated."

cigarette smoke versus heated tobacco aerosol.

"The results showed a 90-95% reduction for these constituents in heated tobacco aerosol compared to cigarette smoke. This reduction aligns with the find-ings of other independent stud-ies," he said.

ies," he said.

While HTP aerosol contains significantly lower levels of harmful chemicals compared to cigarette smoke, it is important to remember that it is not risk

Exposure from alternatives

For one, PMI had conducted a passive exposure study in Japan to assess the impact of tobacco heating systems (THS) use in real-life settings on users and

PMI Regional Scientific Engagement Asia director Tomoko Iida stated that, "this study exposed non-smokers to THS aerosol in a restaurant in Tokyo", with the results showing that the use of THS didn't gener-ate environmental smoke and had no adverse effects on indoor air quality [2].

"Also, non-smokers didn't have an increase in exposure to nicotine and tobacco-specific

nitrosamines (TSNA) as a result

nitrosamines (TSNA) as a result of passive exposure to the THS aerosol," she said.

In tandem, Japan's Health Ministry had also conducted its own studies and concluded that the "results do not negate the inclusion of HTPs within a regulatory framework for indoor tollarible use from exposure to HTPs arable use from exposure to HTPs.

erable use from exposure to HTP aerosol, unlike cigarette smoke". In a reduced emission study published in the Journal of UOEH—the National Institute of Public Health (NIPH) of Japan concluded that "the concentra-tions of nicotine in tobacco fillers and the mainstream smoke of IQOS were almost the same as those of conventional combustion cigarettes, while the concen-tration of TSNAs was one fifth with carbon monoxide one hun-dredth that of conventional combustion cigarettes.

Concerns on accessibility

The GATS Malaysia 2023 survey also revealed that smoking cessation behaviours and healthcare utilisation among smokers have remained stagnant over the past year.

This suggests that while e-ciga-rette use is rising rapidly, efforts to help people quit smoking more broadly have seen limited progress.

Research by Public Health England demonstrated the importance of providing accessi-ble and affordable cessation support and services to help smokers quit.

These include evidence-based interventions such as counsel-

py (NRT) and quittine services. Public awareness campaigns and educational initiatives also play a crucial role in promoting the availability and effectiveness of these resources. of these resources.

Importantly, those aiming to switch to less harmful alternatives or quit need to ensure adequate access to and use of NRT, as inadequate nicotine replace ment or premature discontinua-tion are both linked to a higher likelihood of relapsing to smok-

ing [3].
While current tobacco regulations restrict the sale of cigarettes and other tobacco prod-ucts to individuals under age 18, e-cigarettes and vape products containing nicotine remain

readily accessible to minors.
This accessibility is a growing concern due to the removal of liquid nicotine from the Poisons Act 1952, which was intended to enable taxation on e-liquids with nicotine but inadvertently opened a loophole for unre-

stricted sales.

It is crucial to address this regat its crucial to address this regulatory gap and implement measures to restrict the sale of nicotine-containing products to individuals under the legal age. This can be achieved through

various strategies, such as:

> Enacting legislation that specifically prohibits the sale of nicotine-containing products to

> Implementing age verifica-

tion systems at points-of-sale.

> Raising awareness about the potential risks of tobacco products among youth and parents.

While these products demonstrate significant reductions in harmful chemicals compared to harmful chemicals compared to cigarette smoke, it remains important to address issues of accessibility to minors and implement robust regulations to safeguard public health. By leveraging research findings and raising public awareness about the harm of tobacco use, these strategies have proven effective in reducing smok-

en effective in reducing smok-ing rates, preventing initiation, and protecting public health. Continued research, evalua-

tion, and implementation of evi-dence-based tobacco control strategies are essential to further progress in reducing the burden of tobacco-related diseases.

Big fish caught siphoning treated water

PETALING JAYA: A fishing park in Bagan Hailam has been caught siphoning treated water for its workers and restaurant for about one year.

This was discovered during a joint raid by the National Water Services Commission (SPAN) and Air Selangor on the park off Jalan Pelabuhan Klang Utara in Port Klang.

The fishing park, renowned for its red snapper and sea bass, was found to have made an illegal connection to an Air Selangor standpipe.

This resulted in an estimated loss of RM110,000 in revenue for the water company over the past

SPAN corporate communica-

tions and customer affairs unit director Mohd Fazil Ismail (pic) revealed that the fishing park operator allegedly started tap-



ping treated water from the standpipe in July last year.

"Several industries in the immediate area had complained to Air Selangor about low water pressure. Based on Air Selangor's report, SPAN carried out checks and found an illegal connection," he said.

Mohd Fazil said a 25mm polypipe was used to divert treated water from the standpipe, spanning about 70m, to utility rooms and kitchens within the fishing park.

It is estimated that around 37,000 cubic metres of water was diverted

SPAN has issued a compound and will summon the park owner to assist in further investigations.

"SPAN tested the chlorine content to confirm that it was treated water," Mohd Fazil said, adding that the case will be investigated under Section 123 (1) of the Water Services Industry Act 2006 (Act 655).

He hopes enforcement measures would deter others from stealing treated water.

"We encourage consumers to report water theft to SPAN via phone at 013-388 5000 or email aduan@span.gov.my," he said.

'Selangor can tap national enablers to achieve GDP target'

KUALA LUMPUR: Selangor should leverage national policies and enablers to reach its RM500 billion gross domestic product (GDP) target within three years, said Investment, Trade and Industry Minister Tengku Datuk Seri Zafrul Tengku Abdul Aziz.

Highlighting various national-level plans, such as the green investment strategy, he said this will help Selangor achieve its objectives.

"Selangor's† approved investments in the first quarter of 2024 of RM12.4 billion make it one of the biggest investment contributors to Malaysia's first quarter performance," he said in his keynote address at the 8th Selangor Asean Business Conference 2024.

Tengku Zafrul said with strong collaboration between the ministry, Invest Selangor and Malaysian Investment Development Authority (Mida), he is confident more investments will flow into Selangor.

He said Selangor can leverage Malaysia's chairmanship of Asean next year and Asean's position as a "darling destination" for manufacturing.

He said Asean has a collective GDP of almost US\$3.7 trillion (2022) and is the third largest regional economy in Asia and fifth largest in the world.

Despite global challenges, foreign direct investment (FDI) inflow into Asean stood at US\$155 billion in 2023.

"Thanks to Asean's neutral stance, FDI inflows look set to remain steady in the coming years, particularly amid the geopolitical conflicts between the US and China, as well as between Ukraine and Russia," said Tengku Zafrul.

He said Asean also has a combined population of over 670 million people, of which 213 million, or 31 per cent, are those aged 15-34, making up a young talent pool.

"This demographic dividend is also seen in Selangor, whose working people make up 67 per cent of its population, partly due to its popularity as a 'land of opportunities' for workers from other states."

from other states."
On Malaysia's Asean chairmanship next year, Tengku Zafrul said it is a crucial opportunity to align Asean's direction with national and state economic policies.

"The ministry will lead Malaysia's chairmanship in the economic pillar, guided by the overarching objectives of the Asean Economic Community Council. The ministry is in the process of crafting Malaysia's Priority Economic Deliverables or PEDs."

The PEDs will be framed around four key strategic thrusts, namely[†] enhancing trade and investment between Asean member states, integrating and connecting economies, forging inclusive and sustainable future and transforming the digital future.

"Given Selangor's location in the Klang Valley, businesses stand a strong chance of leveraging key events in Kuala Lumpur to elevate themselves and build their regional profile, particularly as the ministry and its agencies have been working hard to make Malaysia a manufacturing and services hub in the region."

Selangor's GDP growth at 5.4 per cent in 2023 surpassed the national GDP growth of 3.6 per cent.

Meanwhile, Selangor Menteri Besar Datuk Seri Amirudin Shari said the state needs to reinvigorate its manufacturing capacity to reach the RM500 billion GDP target.

He said while the services and manufacturing sectors remain valuable components in Selangor's economic contribution to the country, accounting for 32.6 per cent and 26.7 per cent, respectively, the state government cannot be complacent.

"According to reports, the International Monetary Fund expects emerging and developing Asia to grow 4.3 per cent in 2024.

"The World Bank projected that. Malaysia's economy would grow 4.3 per cent this year and 4.5 per cent in 2025. Rooting out corruption in police force

KUALA LUMPUR: Bukit Aman Integrity and Standards Compliance Department director Datuk Seri Azri Ahmad said 1,671 police officers and personnel were dismissed over the past 10 years.

He said during the same period, 15,546 officers and policemen were subjected to various disciplinary actions and 40,436 disciplinary inquiry papers and investigation papers were opened.

"Between 10,000 and 20,000 police personnel are monitored and directly inspected from time to time by the department's Compliance Branch.

"The priority is on frontline personnel who

interact with the public to ensure they officers and personnel were inspected and perform their duties in compliance with laws, regulations, directives and standard operating procedures.

"An officer found engaging in misconduct will be dealt with accordingly. The basic principle is that the more frequent the inspections, the higher the level of prevention," he said during a celebration of a decade of the department's establishment at Bukit Aman yesterday.

He said 19,352 officers and personnel were inspected last year and 1,396 were found to have committed misconduct.

From January to June this year, 11,221

689 were monitored for various misconduct.

Azri said the department's Intelligence and Operations Branch, which plays a key role as a detection and verification unit, has carried out thousands of operations and made arrests of 798 police officers believed to be involved in various offences, such as gambling, drugs and inappropriate visits to entertainment centres.

He said over the past 10 years, the department has received and handled nearly 50,000 complaints, particularly related to issues of corruption, abuse of power and misconduct. - Bernama

Resolve perennial water supply issues in Petaling Jaya

I AM writing to express my concern over the ongoing and frequent water disruptions that have been severely affecting the residents of Petaling Jaya and surrounding areas. These disruptions have become a recurring issue, causing significant inconvenience and distress to our community.

According to the Air Selangor website, only 90% restoration of the water supply is expected today.

This prolonged disruption highlights the severity of the situation and the urgent need for effective solutions.

As a resident, I have experienced the adverse impact of these frequent water cuts. Basic daily activities such as cooking, cleaning and maintaining hygiene have become challenging tasks.

This situation is particularly dire for vulnerable groups such as the elderly and school-going children, whose health and well-being are compromised due to the lack of reliable water supply.

Moreover, people living in condominiums face unique challenges. They often struggle to access alternative water sources and bear additional costs for water storage solutions.

Residents in walk-up apartments are also significantly affected. Without elevators, they must carry heavy containers of water up multiple flights of stairs, which is especially difficult for the elderly, disabled and those with young children.

The situation in low-income areas is even more troubling, as these residents lack the resources to secure alternative water supplies, exacerbating their existing hardships. Local businesses have also suffered substantial financial losses due to the unreliable water supply, affecting livelihoods and the economy.

The persistent nature of these disruptions suggests underlying issues in the management and maintenance of our water infrastructure.

Despite repeated assurances, the situation has not improved, eroding public trust in the ability of the authorities to effectively manage our water supply.

The relevant authorities must take immediate and effective action to address these issues and restore a reliable water supply to our community.

I urge the responsible parties to conduct a thorough investigation into the root causes of these disruptions and to implement long-term solutions to prevent future occurrences.

Our community's well-being depends on a dependable water supply, and this issue must be given the urgent attention it deserves.

I hope that by raising awareness through this letter, we can prompt necessary actions by the local authorities to resolve this critical issue.

ESG: A data-driven approach

ESG criteria are standards for a company's operations that socially conscious investors use to screen potential investments

Unlike CSR, which is often more qualitative and driven by goodwill. ESG is quantitative, data-driven and used as a business

ESG criteria are divided into three main categories

1. Environmental

Measures a company's impact on the environment, including carbon emissions, waste management, and energy efficiency.

Investors look for metrics that show a company is actively reducing its environmental footprint.

2. Social

Evaluates how a company manages relationships with employees, suppliers, customers, and the communities where it operates. Metrics include labour practices,

diversity, community engagement and human rights.

3. Governance

Assess a company's leadership, executive pay, audits, internal controls and shareholder rights. Governance metrics evaluate ethical and transparent operations at the highest levels.

FSG criteria are used by investors to make informed decisions about where to allocate their

Companies with strong ESG metrics are often seen as lower-risk, more sustainable investments.

3. Maintain transparency

> Be transparent about CSR activities and impacts.

> Report regularly with clear, measurable data.

> Communicate efforts and achievements to stakeholders through reports, websites and social media.



Small steps toward the big ESG leap

Implementing sustainable practices and action steps for SMEs

FOR small and medium sized enterprises (SMEs) to accept sustainability and integrate environmental, social and governance (ESG) principles within their company framework, the changes have to be digestible. Reasons for implementing them

should also be comprehensible and not colluded by overly complex installation methods and explanations.

Many are also worried that the way they instate these principles may not be proper due to their lack of knowledge.

They worry that if these methods are inefficiently set up, that could potentially become a real expense over time.

However, there are steps businesses can take that need not be confusing or a drain of resources.

All they need is a bit of planning.



1. Setting goals and targets

All ventures start on the drawing board and detailing a sustainability roadmap is no different.

> Set clear and measurable sustainability goals

 Identify materiality by determining the ESG issues most relevant to your business and stakeholders via surveys, stakeholder interviews or data analysis;

 Prioritise issues that will affect your business and environment first;

> Implement SMART (Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, Time-bound) goals, a set of reminders that provide clear, actionable and



achievable action to reach an objective:.

Some examples of SMART

- Reduce energy consumption by 20% within the next 3 years.

- Increase the use of recycled materials in product packaging by 30% by the end of 2025. - Achieve 100% supplier

 Achieve 100% supplier compliance with the company's sustainable sourcing policy by 2026.

 Train 80% of employees on sustainable business practices by the end of 2024.

> When using SMART, assess your current impact on the environment and society via energy use, waste generation and supply chain.



2) It's a team effort

To ensure sustainability is well implemented, your employees have to be on-board. Here are some of the best ways to engage with your staff on ESG:

> Offer a clear narrative on the company's direction in ESG and how they can be part of something larger;

> Provide training and workshops on ESG concepts, best practices and show how they can achieve sustainability targets;

> Encourage employee involvement by creating employee committees to implement initiatives, or run awards to recognise those who achieve their sustainability goals, and provide a platform for feedback;

> Set up practical steps in green initiatives, such as waste reduction, energy conservation and recycling or engaging in a proper work-life balance in the work culture;

> Support sustainability causes they are passionate about either in environment, social or governance;

> Demonstrate leadership by visibly supporting ESG-focused initiatives, which includes ethical conduct, providing employee benefits and creating an environment for where diversity and inclusivity can thrive.



3. Collaboration and partnerships

One good way to further your ESG agenda is to collaborate your efforts with your shareholders, suppliers and peers. Collaboration and partnerships expand your sustainability efforts by:

by:

> Availing shared financial and technological resources, as well as expertise and knowledge to address any sustainability issue;

> Working together increases the impact by reaching a wider audience and implementing solutions at a larger scale;

> Managing risk would be more effective as responsibility and knowledge will be shared among the collaborators and partners;

> Expanding creativity and innovation when tackling ESG-related issues thanks to diverse perspectives;

> Enhancing reputation through commitment and building trust between partners; > Engaging regulatory compliance through shared understanding and rallying collective action.

4) Monitoring and reporting

Like any business plan that has been implemented, management can only gauge the effectiveness if there is empirical data available. This process ensures the sustainability plans are initiated correctly to produce desired results.

SMEs have several frameworks that they can follow to quantifiably track their ESG progress.

> Simplified ESG Disclosure Guide (SEDG)

Launched on Oct 19 last year by an affiliate of the Securities Commission Malaysia, Capital Markets Malaysia, the SEDG aims to provide SMEs with a practical, structured guidance on disclosures concerning ESG matters in a clear and concise manner.

SMEs can track and report even as they scale up with its three maturity levels as companies level up in their sustainability journey.

> Miti's i-ESG Framework While the SEDG was meant

for most SMEs, Miti's I-ESG Framework, which was launched Oct 2 last year, targeted the manufacturing sector in Malaysia

It is a comprehensive approach that covers environmental, social and governance aspects relevant to the manufacturing industry.

The framework aims to enhance the sector's environmental sustainability, economic



benefits, and social equity and has four components: standards, capacity building, financing and

mechanism.

It also lists 70 strategies, 50 deliverables and is supported by six enablers.

> UN Global Compact Network Malaysia & Brunei (UNGC) SME Sustainability Action Guide

This guide provides SMEs strong reasons to embrace ESG, with direct and indirect benefits to their business and the planet simultaneously. Specifically for SMEs, the guide is supported with real life examples of sustainability initiatives taken by some Malaysian SMEs and how they have gained from this venture.

It also takes a structured and practical approach to show SMEs what they should focus on in their implementation, tracking and reporting.

HY is the government not able to solve problems? This is perhaps one of the most common grouses people across the globe have towards their respective governments. While it is a question, one should bear in mind that governments hold behemoth tasks that take time and effort from individuals who - just like any other person, have their own mindset and are affected by behavioural biases to overcome.

This brings us to another question - is there a need for mindset shifts amid this age of transformation and sustainability? Yes, there is when there's progress to be made starting from the grassroots, all the way up to governance.

As mentioned in the first part of the cover story, Sweden's recent legislation mandates the separation of food waste for both households and businesses, while all local authorities in Sweden are required to establish systems for the separate collection of food waste. Given that the Swedes have been practising food waste separation for some time, it's safe to say the country's efforts have a high chance of success. Yet, the same cannot be said in the Malaysian context.

Who is that "someone else"?

All humans have been guilty of committing the "if I don't do it, someone else will" behaviour at some point in life. This relates to a phenomenon called diffusion of responsibility, which is similar to the bystander effect. Simply put, it occurs when each individual assumes someone else will take up the responsibility and act on it, but no one actually does.

This mindset comes into play with pressing matters the world currently faces, such as climate change, human rights, destruction of nature's assets (natural resources, environment and animals).

If each person pushes responsibility to the next person, who is going to be the "someone else" that would do the right thing - no matter how small the act - that could ripple into larger-scale change in society? For efforts in driving a sustainable future to work, people, businesses and government are required to change their mindset and take up some form of social responsibility to achieve social sustainability that can benefit society as a whole.

According to the World Bank, communities and societies that are more socially sustainable are more willing and able to work together to overcome challenges, deliver public goods, and allocate scarce resources in ways perceived to be legitimate and fair so that all people may thrive over time.

Comprising four key components - social cohesion, inclusion, resilience, and process legitimacy - social sustainability is fundamental in addressing today's development challenges and is the social counterpart to environmental and economic sustainability.

Social responsibility boosts sustainability

Social responsibility is defined as



Individuals and companies aiming to be socially responsible can adopt policies that promote well-being of society and the environment, while lessening the negative impacts on them.

Shifting mindset and behaviour for people, profit, planet

Individuals, companies and governments need to adopt the right mindset and behaviour to drive social responsibility that can enhance sustainability efforts in the long run

an ethical framework whereby an organisation or individual, has an obligation to act for the benefit of society at large. It is a means of achieving sustainability as adopting key social responsibility principles, such as accountability and transparency, can help ensure long-term viability and success of organisations or systems.

A research titled *The Impact of Environmental, Social and Governance Practices (ESG) on Economic Performance: Evidence from ESG Score* has shown that businesses with low corporate social practices (CSP) have higher financial performance than firms with moderate CSP, but firms with high CSP have the highest financial performance. This supports the theoretical argument that stakeholders can transform social responsibility into profit.

The paper conceptualises CSP into a three-dimensional concept corporate social responsibilities, (economic, legal, ethical, discretionary), corporate social responsiveness (defence, reaction, accommodation, pro-action) and social issues (consumers, environment, product safety, employee discrimination/safety and shareholders).

According to the research, CSP can also be defined as a construct that emphasises a company's responsibilities to multiple stakeholders, such as employees and the community as a whole, in addition to its traditional responsibilities to economic shareholders.

Another study conducted by Singapore's Nanyang Technological University titled *Institutional share*- holders and corporate social responsibility disclosed that institutional shareholders (a company or organisation such as hedge fund, mutual funds that invests money on behalf of clients or members) can generate real social impact.

The research highlights that institutional shareholders mainly drive improvements in CSR issues that are financially material to firm values. Furthermore, higher ownership is found to specifically reduce certain negative CSR issues that might lead to lawsuits or regulatory penalties due to gender discrimination, unsafe workplaces, non-compliance with environmental regulations, or improper marketing.

Meanwhile, the report also mentions prior studies have shown that individual investors could derive utility by investing in accordance with their social preferences for social responsibility.

Shifting mindset

From "if I don't do it, someone else will" to "we want to do it" is the mindset shift that is needed now in advancing sustainability efforts.

Stewardship Asia Centre (SAC) chief executive officer Rajeev Peshawaria opines that more business leaders should see themselves as "steward leaders" of planet earth and humanity.

ity.
"These steward leaders pivot
from seeing sustainability as a cost
compliance or risk problem to a
win-win-win growth opportunity.
Yes, they want to make money, but
they do it by addressing the most
pressing human problems today,"

says Rajeev in a radio podcast regarding SAC's recently published Boards as Stewards of Sustainability report.

Stewardship Asia Centre is a non-profit organisation established by Temasek dedicated to help business and government leaders, investors, and individuals accelerate leadership action on environmental and social challenges through catalytic knowledge and advisory.

Rajeev shares that steward leaders have set their mind to inculcate good values into their organisation's DNA.

"The first is interdependence - the more we do for society, the more the business is going to succeed. Second is the long-term view - to think in generations not in quarters or years.

"Third is they adopt an ownership mentality - taking ownership to do business and make money by solving problems. Fourth is creative resilience, which is all about innovation."

He notes that the four values mentioned above are embedded into the company culture so that everybody behaves with these values, even when no one is looking.

"It's not easy to do, but by walking the talk, steward leaders create that culture. They also articulate a purpose which differs from the normal purpose - which is to make money and not break the law while doing it.

"A stewardship purpose differs from normal purpose in the sense that it creates a collective better future for stakeholders, society, future generations, and the environ-

ment. We call it the steward leadership compass.

"Then through the lens of this compass, make decisions from strategy to pricing, execution, to hiring. When this is done, you're going to make money in the long run and stay profitable for hundreds of years, not just quarters," he says.

He adds that the board of every company plays a crucial role in pursuing steward leadership.

"Steward leadership, more than anything else, is an intentionality to do well by doing good. It is something anyone can acquire without training. You just need to keep your eyes and ears open to see what society and our planet is going through.

"Steward leaders want to do well by doing good. I want my life to matter, my business to matter," says Rajeev.

To sum up, adopting the right mindset is crucial in practising social responsibility but one must also keep in mind that nothing can be achieved without consistent action.

A tale of two cities: Selangor and Stockholm

Examining the government's role in promoting and supporting social responsibility through urban development

It goes beyond economic considerations and encompasses social, environmental and ethical dimensions.

Socially responsible governments enable sustainable development by ensuring that urban growth minimises negative environmental impacts, promotes resource efficiency and maintains long-term ecological balance.

Social responsibility for governments

In the context of urban planning, social responsibility for governments and municipalities involves several key aspects.

First, it requires equitable and inclusive development, ensuring equal access to resources, services and opportunities for all members of society. Not only that, it also prioritises public health and safety through measures to protect public wellbeing, maintain clean environments and improve safety conditions.

Stakeholder engagement and colaboration are essential in social responsibility, as they actively nvolve the public in decision-makng processes, fostering community engagement and making collaborative efforts with stakeholders to address social challenges collectivety.

What's happening in Stockholm?

In terms of urban planning, Smart City Sweden is a Swedish state-founded export platform that nitiates cooperation between Sweden and other countries within smart and sustainable city soluions.

Stockholm, the capital city of sweden, is taking significant steps to promote sustainability and advance urban planning, with one of the key measures implemented by the city being the mandatory collection of food waste.

Beginning this year, a recent legislation in Sweden mandates the separation of food waste for both households and businesses,

Additionally, all local authorities in Sweden are required to establish systems for the separate collection of food waste.

Although food waste separation has been practised in various regions of the country for some ime, it is only now being officially regulated by law.

According to calculations from stockholm Vatten och Avfall—the company responsible for the capial's waste management—a mere Skg of food waste can power a carbo cover an impressive distance of lmost a mile".



According to PLANMalaysia, the government has also provided guidelines for developing sanitary landfills and waste processing facilities to manage waste effectively and minimise the environmental impact of landfills.

In related news, Stockholm Vattenoch Avfall is building a sorting plant in Högdalen to enable more households living in apartments to sort out their food waste, which is a new approach to the local government's role in providing recycling facilities:

Swedes recognise food waste as a valuable energy source. It is utilised—among other applications—to produce biogas, serving as a sustainable substitute for fossil fuels used in buses, lorries and even cars.

In addition, Avfall Sverige, the Swedish waste management organisation, reveals that a significant majority of municipalities in Sweden, specifically 256 out of 290, have implemented varying levels of food waste collection systems at the source.

However, some smaller municipalities, particularly those located in northern Sweden and rural areas, have yet to introduce such systems.

The decision to abstain from implementation is often a result of the substantial costs associated with low population densities, long distances and challenging weather conditions, which make waste management more difficult in these regions.

Closer to home

Similarly, the Town and Country Planning Department (PLANMalaysia) has implemented several initiatives to improve access to sustainable waste management and recycling services in urban areas across Malaysia.

PLANMalaysia is a department under the Housing and Local Government Ministry (KPKT), with the goal of improving people's wellbeing and national prosperity by 2030.

The department provides planning advisory services and helps local authorities prepare development plans at all levels,

Some of their notable key measures include: > Comprehensive waste collection and disposal: The government has mandated regular waste collection schedules to ensure timely removal of fiousehold and commercial waste. It has also provided guidelines for developing sanitary landfills and waste processing facilities to manage waste effectively and minimise environmental impact.

> Recycling programmes:
PLANMalaysia has made it a
requirement to provide recycling
bins and the establishment of recycling centres to encourage waste
segregation and recycling among
residents. Public awareness campaigns have been faunched to educate people on the importance of
recycling and proper waste disposal. They added that the government
is also supporting the development
of waste-to-energy facilities to conversions.

> Green neighbourhood initiatives: The urban planning framework includes promoting urban farming practices in communities, which incorporates composting and the reduction of single-use plastics to further improve was

> Waste disposal regulations: Enforcement of regulations for proper waste disposal, including hazardous waste.

> Sustainability monitoring:
Using the Malaysian Urban-Rural
National Indicators Network for
Sustainable Development
(MURNInets) to measure and assess
the sustainability of a local authority
area through urban indicators,

They have also introduced intervention plans such as the Land Use Planning Master Plan For National Food Production Area (KAGUMN) to reduce our dependence on imported food products and increase our self-sufficiency rate.

PLANMalaysia's sustainable urban development strategies to enhance livability and environmental sustainability across our cities.

According to PLANMalaysia, they ensure successful implementation of community-based planning or micro-planning through several special action plans as the fourth tier planning - namely the Urban Special Action Plan (PTKB), Rural Special Action Plan (PTKB) and Community Special Action Plan (PTKLB) and Community Special Action Plan (PTKK).

"These plans enable community-based projects to solve current issues that need fast action and fulfil the needs of the community. The fourth tier planning or micro-planning must address people's needs. To plan for the people by the people, and to let the people shape the environment they want to live in," PLANMalaysia told StarESG.

"The upcoming 5th National Physical Plan (NPP5) and the 3rd National Urbanisation Policy (NUP3) will further strengthen the people and community aspects by stressing on the human scale planning and community building for our future cities as visualised by Malaysia MADANI's aspiration."

PLANMalaysia is also involved in planning guidelines to promote uniform access to resources, services and opportunities across Malaysian sceich.

As they are the leader in urban and rural planning in Malaysia, their other initiatives also include ensuring access to affordable housing, equitably distributing public facilities such as healthcare and education, improving public transportation connectivity, expanding community development projects and promoting sustainable management of natural resources.

These measures aim to create a more inclusive society where all residents have the chance to thrive, regardless of their background or location.

Meanwhile in local news, The Star reported (May 15) that Selangor's waste management system would undergo a due diligence period of inspection ahead of its plan to adopt the Solid Waste and Put Cleansing Management Act (Ad 672).

Housing and Local Governm Minister Nga Kor Ming had sai all of Selangor's assets related public waste were undergoing thorough inspection by the Na Solid Waste Management Department.

Previously on March 10, Nga announced that Selangor had agreed in principle to adopt Ac after Selangor Ruler Sultan Sharafudin Idris Shah granted an audience to which the latter sented to adopting the Act.

The Act, which is better know Act 672, makes it compulsory fi solid waste to be separated int recyclables and non-recyclables Although, it is currently only

Although, it is currently only applied to the states of Pahang Johor, Melaka, Negri Sembilan, Perlis and Kedah, as well as Kua Lumpur and Putrajaya.

Zooming in on Selangor

Although, Stockholm is focus specifically on organic waste (fr food waste generated by house holds), Selangor has been maki significant strides in waste man ment, with several-key componshaping its current landscape.

Waste collection and public cleansing in Selangor are prima handled by KDEB Waste Management (KDEBWM), a state owned enterprise.

KDEBWM is responsible for domestic waste collection, bulky waste removal, street sweeping drain cleaning, ensuring a clean and more organised environme for residents.

However, the reliance on land for waste disposal remains a pri ry challenge. With landfills reach capacity, Selangor recognises th need for alternative waste mana ment solutions.

In response to landfills reaching peak capacity, the state is also undertaking the Selangor Green Energy Eco Park (SGEEP) project, which includes the construction waste-to-energy (WTE) plant in Rawang

The existing infrastructure, ma aged by KDEBWM, emphasises waste collection and disposal.

However, with the construction the SGEEP waste-to-energy plant and the presence of nascent reciding initiatives, Selangor is movific towards a more sustainable and comprehensive waste managem approach.

Scientific approaches to long-term solutions

Practical, holistic solutions needed to address interconnected challenges to sustainable development

HE world continues to face pressing issues - from poverty and inequality to climate change and resource scarcity - posing significant barriers to achieving sustainable development.

Governments are often con strained by bureaucracy and budg-etary limitations, hindering the speed at which comprehensive, innovative solutions are delivered.

This is where the private sector. corporations in particular, have a critical role to play - possessing the resources, expertise and agility that can complement and enhance public sector efforts.

Consumers and stakeholders are increasingly demanding that businesses be a force for positive change, driven by a growing aware-ness of environmental, social and governance (ESG) issues

From concerns over climate change and social inequalities to corporate scandals, the public is placing greater emphasis on the ethical conduct and social impact of companies, rather than solely focusing on profits.

This shift in consumer and stakeholder expectations has compelled businesses to recognise that maximising shareholder value is no longer a sustainable long-term strat-

Urbanisation: A closer look

Urbanisation, the rapid growth and development of cities, has given rise to persistent societal challenges, chief among them are pockets of poverty and neighbourhood decay.

Often driven by the migration of rural populations seeking better economic opportunities in cities, these underserved communities tend to lack access to basic services, healthcare and educational resource es—these disparities between afflu-ent and underprivileged communities become even more stark.

For instance, Desa Mentari, a low cost housing area in Petaling Jaya, is situated just 2km away from the affluent Sunway City Kuala Lumpur, yet the living conditions and access to resources in these two communities differ vastly.

Home to approximately 26,104 residents from various ethnic backgrounds, including Malay, Indian, Chinese and others, Desa Mentari's vibrant diversity reflects the multicultural heritage of our nation.

That said, the community is pre

dominantly composed of individuals from the lower-income (B40) segment, grappling with a troubling array of health, social, economic and infrastructural issues

On the public health front, the community contends with a high prevalence of infectious diseases particularly dengue fever, as well as pressing mental health concerns.

Desa Mentari's ageing infrastruc ture further exacerbates these health risks, posing serious hazards to the wellbeing of its residents.

Beyond health, the community also faces socioeconomic hurdles, including limited economic opportunities, barriers to quality education and tensions around community harmony and social interactions.

Solutions for inclusive development

Recognising the need to address urbanisation and its far-reaching implications, Sunway Group chairman's office executive director Ong Pang Yen said: "We believe we need-now more than ever-to divert more attention and resources to finding solutions and to act on

"We need innovations, new inventions and interventions. We need to put to practise what we preach. We need to work on and invest in the solutions," he said.

This is also in reference to the latest UN progress report which found that for half of the measurable targets, progress has been slow and inadequate

Even worse, another 30% of these targets haven't budged or have actually gotten worse

With this in mind, Sunway is taking a comprehensive, data-driven approach to aid in enhancing the quality-of-life of residents by empowering them through the Desa Mentari Community Observatory

Long-term solutions

Ong explained that Sunway plans to deploy researchers to measure baseline data points through the Desa Mentari initiative to tangibly address Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) targets.

Targets such as SDG 3: Good health and wellbeing - Targets 3.3.1, 3.3.2 and 3.3.3 are aimed at fighting communicable diseases like HIV, tuberculosis and malaria.

"The purpose of setting up a pilot community observatory is to make all SDG intervention projects traceable and measurable so they can be continuously improved to achieve

the best possible impact and results," he noted.

He continued saying that interventions are only effective if they have strong follow through.

Through its agritech company Sunway XFarms, Sunway aims to assist in relieving the community's economic struggles and enhance food security by helping residents learn how to grow their own pro-

This would not only increase access to fresh produce for residents, but also create new income-generating opportunities

> Education: Beyond the direct economic benefits, the Desa Mentari Community Observatory project will also involve setting up an education arm to bring up literacy and education levels.
"Sunway University's researchers

can recommend interventions, using a motivational approach to inspire school-going children in the vicinity to pursue education right up until to the tertiary level," said Ong, emphasising that this would help address targets that are part of SDG 4: Quality education.

> Healthcare: Sunway University's researchers could also recommend interventions in line with SDG 3: Good health and wellbeing if the baseline data shows huge gaps in the health and wellbe ing of Desa Mentari residents.

For example, if an organisation or corporation conducts health screening for malaria within a community, it's not enough to only inform residents - there must also be a solution to address root causes. This could be in the form of mobile clinics or fogging. But, interventions at scale will require funding, and this is where other corporations can come on board to support this initiative.

Nonetheless, Ong said that Sunway will be underwriting the project for its initial years.

He also added that progress will be monitored and measured over the years for effectiveness and impact, with the methodology being adjusted and improved along the

Coupled with a community learning hub, vocational training and healthcare support in the pipeline, Sunway's multifaceted strategy is taking the approach of empowerment - enabling the residents of Desa Mentari to become active agents of their own development. fostering a model of inclusive, community-driven progress

Take social media platforms to task, urge experts

PETALING JAYA: A system to hold social media platforms accountable for not complying with local laws and regulations is necessary, says an expert.

Malaysia Cyber Consumer Association president Siraj Jalil said that while fining individuals could help address some issues, it is equally important to ensure that platform owners are also held responsible for the content they allow on their sites.

"This approach would encourage these companies to invest more in moderation and compliance mechanisms, ultimately making the online space safer for everyone," he said.

On Wednesday, Communications Minister Fahmi Fadzil said the Malaysian Communications and Multimedia Commission's (MCMC) monitoring found varying levels of compliance with Malaysian laws across different social media based on a percentage of a platplatforms. based on a percentage of a platform's gross revenue highlight

Meta platforms showed higher compliance, with Facebook at 85%, Instagram at 88% and WhatsApp at 79%.

In comparison, TikTok stood at 76% and Telegram at 65%. X (formerly Twitter) significantly lagged at 25%.

Fahmi also said the police, MCMC and Attorney General's Chambers will collaborate to take immediate action against cybercrimes committed on social media platforms.

Derek Fernandez, a member of the MCMC, said the imposition of a legal regulatory framework will lead to a much higher level of commitment from these platforms to protect their uses.

He said social media platforms face significant regulations in other countries, including the European Union, the United States, Vietnam, Indonesia and Singapore.

"In the EU, for example, fines

based on a percentage of a platform's gross revenue highlight the seriousness of the EU regulators and EU digital sovereignty framework towards platforms taking seriously shared responsibility for effectively combating online harms and cybersecurity threats.

"Such fines are certainly effective in showing regulatory seriousness towards platforms that use their best efforts to prevent cybercrime on their proprietary platforms," he said.

Fernandez said proper regulation would make platforms legally obligated to respond to complaints of cybercrime, child sexual abuse material, and online harassment, and that they would be held liable if these issues are ignored.

Meanwhile, a child rights advocate is calling for stricter laws that require tech companies to quickly remove images of child sex abuse when they are reported.

Srividhya Ganapathy, co-chairperson of the Crib Foundation, a non-governmental organisation focusing on action for child protection, emphasises the need for an effective takedown policy.

"What we need is a takedown policy where a child can call and report an image, which will result in an immediate action to takedown the images.

"We need laws in place to enable this, including laws to compel online platforms and tech firms to take extensive measures to remove child sex abuse material and protect children from further harm.

"More often than not, in situations like this, children will be too afraid to disclose to their parents or teachers.

"In these circumstances, the best solution is to provide children with a direct way to complain," she said.

Through her work on the Talisman Project, which empowers and educates children about online safety, Srividhya has met children as young as 10 years old who have shared their encounters with online predators.

She said some victims would find themselves in an endless nightmare, as the individuals who received their photos would then share them in other groups on social media.

"The compromising content stays online because there is a wide network of online predators and there is a vast global market for the sale of child sexual abuse materials," she said.

Srividhya also wants the government to take measures that are not just immediate but those that are also well researched "and which would place Malaysian systems for the protection of children online on par with global standards".

According to Siraj, he said children, teenagers and women are most vulnerable to cyberbullying and online harassment while the elderly and those unfamiliar with technology are prime targets for various cybercrimes.

River polluters could still face jail, RM10mil fine

PETALING JAYA: Those found ment portfolio. guilty of polluting a river that caused massive water cuts in the Klang Valley earlier this week could face a mandatory five-year jail term and a maximum RM10mil fine, says Jamaliah Environmental Quality Act. Jamaluddin.

These penalties are as outlined under Section 25 of the Environmental Quality Act, said Jamaliah, who is in charge of Selangor's health and environ-

It was earlier reported that two individuals who had been detained by the Environment Department are being investigated under Section 25 of the

She said this in response to reports that the culprits behind the pollution, which was traced to a facility processing acrylic materials in Jalan Kampung Orang Asli, Kuang, in Rawang,

had only been fined RM1,000 and had their business licence suspended for seven days.

"The RM1,000 fine and suspension of the business licence are just based on the local authority's by-law.

"There are other laws that will come into play once the investigation papers are ready," Jamaliah said.

She added that the Selangor Water Management Board (Luas)

is also investigating the duo under a different law, namely Section 79 (1) of the Luas Enactment 1999, which carries a minimum fine of RM200,000 up to a maximum of RM1mil and a mandatory jail term not exceeding three years.

The odour pollution in the river had led to the shutdown of four water treatment plants in Selangor, causing a cut in water supply to thousands of households.

ALIEN fishes lurking in our rivers threaten the existing ecosystem, says Universiti Putra Malaysia Faculty of Science Biology Department lecturer Prof Dr Mohammad Noor Amal

He said ikan bandaraya had He said ikan bandaraya had characteristics such as rapid growth, prolific breeding rate, lack of predators and tolerance to lower water quality.

To combat the issue, the Fisheries Department releases native fishes into the environment.

Over the past five years, it has released more than 1.11 million native fishes into rivers.

So far, four operations have been initiated this year, resulting in the release of 218,000 native river species, including freshwater prayars and light forms. ter prawns and ikan lampam

ter prawns and ikan lampam (tinfoil barb).

The year 2022 saw the highest number of native species released, which was 355,450 across 10 species including tinfoil barb, freshwater prawns, golden belly barb (kerai); silver catfish (patin) and mahseer (kelah) at 13 locations.

Selangor Fisheries Department.

Selangor Fisheries Department director Noraisyah Abu Bakar said they were tackling non-native fish and invasive

non-native fish.

The invasive species are those that impact other species negatively and to an extent, its

surroundings.

ONCE teeming with aquatic life, Sungai Langat, near Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia (UKM), in Bangi, Selangor, is now filled

"I had to change my fishing method to one that allows me to target specific fish," Ahmad said.

Before the proliferation of invasive species in the river, he could catch at least RM2,500 worth of fish in a month, but now, the most he could get was RM1,000 on a good day.

Ahmad said during his last visit to Sungai Langat, he fished from midnight to dawn but only caught ikan bandaraya.

UNDER the First Selangor Plan (RS-1), 33.7% of major projects and initiatives have been completed, says Datuk Seri Amirudin Shari.

The Mentri Besar said the remaining 66.3% were at various stages of implementation.

"We have written many letters and even lodged complaints with Kuala Lumpur City Hall (DBKL) through its website to do something about these vehicles," said Kampung Muhibbah PPR Residents Association chairman Attar Bacha Haja.

"We even reached out to the Seputeh Residents Representative Council (MPPWP) for help – I did everything I could to get help, but nothing has come out of my efforts."

but nothing has come out of my efforts."

According to Attar, the main road in front of the community hall was a crucial artery used by residents, school buses and those visiting the clinic.

The abandoned cars occupy part of the road and nearby residents end up double- and sometimes triple-parked, creating further congestion.

The clinic's Dr Afzan Zaini echoed Attar's sentiment, adding that clinic staff and nurses who arrived early often found their path blocked by double- and triple-parked cars.

"We have to wait for people to move their cars so that we can enter the community complex

move their cars so that we can-enter the community complex area," she said.

Dr Afzan said there had been times when traffic was backed up to the Shah Alam Expressway (Kesas).

Just outside the community hall, main roads along Jalan Puchong on Kuala Lumpur side and walkways are cluttered with abandoned cars as well.

When contacted, DBKL executive director (Socio-Economic Development) Ismadi Sakirin said the DBKL enforcement team had visited the area and issued four notices at the site. "Vehicles will only be removed after the notice expires, which is early next week," he said.



Separately, DBKL removed abandoned stalls with torn, fraying canopies and broken furniture on Jalan 4/155 following a StarMetro report on July 22, titled "Abandoned stalls in Bukit OUG an eyesore".

Enforcement officers from DBKL's Seputeh branch took away the items under Section 46(1)(d) of the Street, Drainage and Building Act 1974.

Among the items seized were plastic tables and chairs, canopies, iron table frames, cooking stoves and other equipment.
